Open Letter To Richard Kelly

Your very informative letter touching on the tremendous fight in New Jersey before the Supreme Court approved public bus transportation for parochial students was quite an eye-opener.

Fortunately, my eyes opened wider when you had the picture of some of your readers mentally rubbing their hands in gleeful anticipation of just such an unnecessary political wrangle erupting in the State of Michigan with the little town of Farmington as a springboard.

Your article, I would like to note that many of the parochial schools in New Jersey have no need to avail themselves of the reimbursement approved by the Supreme Court and their own legislation.

You are so right though when you say that "there is involved a Constitutional principle which is likely to transcend the question of a few dollars for buses. We aren't trying to settle some religious issue here but rather a political issue as dictated by American democracy. But perhaps you are misinterpreting the Constitution, as our forefathers composed it? Perhaps you are hypnotized yourself with that frayed-at-the-edges cliché — "separation of Church and State."

As you see it, our forefathers were so concerned with providing freedom of worship, and all of the advantages provided by the people, available to the people, that their chief concern was to insure that "separation of Church and State."

Are you perhaps concerning yourself with the possibility that the parochial schools having obtained a tax-credit, as it were, in the outlandish demand on public funds in the future? I hardly think so. The Catholic Church produced some of the world's greatest scholars centuries before the Farmington School Board ever existed. I'm quite sure in the education of youth, it will continue to function just as smoothly and efficiently with or without buses.

After all, if Mr. Ginsberg, the bus driver, is required to transport Lee Fong Yang, Rastus Jones and his own little Sammy to the public schools and the McGillicuddy's the Rakowskis and the Gerlarts to the parochial schools, it is certainly not required of him or his public school charges, to stop off and worship God in the faith of his parochial riders. It is expected of him, though, to perform his duties to the best of his ability to all of these minor citizens of Farmington.

Mr. Kelly, I don't think it's necessary to worry about the longed-for litigation of a constitutional question jeopardizing our community. Just make sure that any religious sect providing accredited and lawful education is free to utilize the taxes paid by their own members, insofar as they have a legitimate need. You won't have

Convert Facilities At Local Hospital

Plans have been completed for complete conversion of the Farmington Children's Hospital for the care of mentally retarded children. The conversion is completed, a total of 250 identically retarded children will be cared for at the hospital.

A \$100,000-year lease of the main floor of the building from the Children's Hospital of Michigan, Incorporated, was approved by the State Administrative Board. The first floor, it is estimated, will provide for 127 more beds. State patients now occupy 133 beds on the second floor of the building. A part of the third floor is used by administrative personnel.

Work was started on moving patients and equipment out of the Children's Hospital the first of June. The State will begin moving in mentally retarded youngsters on the main floor around the middle of the month, hospital officials said.
