The Springfield Civic Association will hold a business meeting at 8 p.m. Monday, June 11, at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Rickert, 30924 Grand River at 9 Mile Road. A financial report pertaining to the recent road-building will be read and discussed at the meeting. Due to the fact that the Annual School District election will be held on June 11, the Association will hold its annual meeting one-half hour later than usual.

Robert F. Rickert, a member of the Clarenceville School Board since 1952, will seek re-election to the Board for a third year term. While on the Clarenceville Board, Rickert has served two years as president, one year as secretary, and one year as treasurer.

Rickert, 42, lives at 19327 Luthers in Livonia and has been a resident of the School District for the past 19 years. He is married and the father of two children: Robert, 20, and Carol Ann, 16. Rickert is a supervisor at the Cadillac Motor Car Company, where he has worked for the past 16 years. Prior to that time he was employed in the plumbing and heating business.

Active in community affairs, Rickert is a charter member of the Clarenceville Optimist Club and is serving as vice president. He is also a member of the Clarenceville T. A. and the Michigan Association of School Board members. He served as a member of the Livonia Parks and Recreation Commission in 1953 and 1954, and was reappointed to that body this year. He also served as a member of the Clarenceville Recreation Commission in 1949.

"During the four years that I have been a member of the Clarenceville Board of Education, it has been my desire to do everything possible to provide for the best educational experience and welfare of our children," Rickert said. "It is my hope and anticipation to continue the work of providing the best educational facilities, staff, curricula, and overall program for which we are able to pay."

"The Board of Education during my tenure has endeavored and been successful in providing facilities so that we would not have half-day sessions. It is my wish that we continue to avoid half-day sessions and keep abreast of all the programs that will keep our schools among the leaders," he emphasized.

Rickert cited 14 major accomplishments of the Board during his tenure, including building and program additions and improvements, increased transportation facilities, and the re-writing of policies and procedures for the School District.

Warner Farms Residents Hear Progress Report

A general meeting of the Warner Farms Improvement Association was held on May 21 at the Farmington High School cafeteria. Reports were received from the various standing committees.

The restrictions committee reported investigating several restriction violations and all were satisfactorily adjusted. Favorable comments were made on the speed with which the City responded to requests for street repairs in the subdivision.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Warner Farms Association has been set for sometime in September. Details as to the time and place will be published later.
