

## Deer Hunters Prefer November 15 Opening

A Conservation Department poll of deer hunters shows 55 per cent of the hunters prefer the present November 15 opening of their 16-day season.

Some 24 per cent prefer a Saturday opening, 12 per cent want a weekday opening and four per cent prefer Sunday.

The special opinion poll sampled some 1200 hunters - every 350th deer hunting license sold last season.

On Thursday, June 7, the speech class of Clarenceville High School will hold a picnic at Cass Benton Park in Northville.

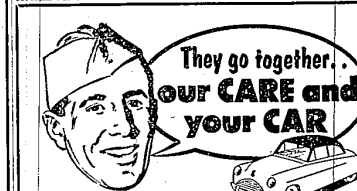

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## CAUTION URGED WHEN HANDLING INSECTICIDES

A spray gun can be a lethal weapon - unless it is handled with care, according to state health officials, who issue a plea for caution in the use of insect poisons, which cause needless deaths each year in Michigan.

Anyone using insect sprays such as DDT, Lindane, Malathion and Chlordane, the state health department said, should wear protective clothing - coveralls, tight-fitting goggles, gloves and boots. Following the spraying, the department recommends a change of clothing and a warm shower to remove any of the poison dusts or mist which may have reached exposed parts of the body.

John C. Soet, department of occupational health spokesman, added that organic phosphates - notably Parathion - should be handled with extreme care. Soet said a gas mask respirator should be worn when using sprays of this type, and if any discomfort whatever occurs during or following the use of the insecticide, you should get medical attention immediately.

"Several deaths occur every year because of careless use of insecticides," Soet warned. "Never open a package of insecticide without carefully reading the label, and then follow instructions. Otherwise, your spray gun may be lethal, not just to insects, but to yourself, a member of your family, or to livestock."

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## New Fish Sorter Speeds Work Of Field Men

A cantankerous conservation problem appears solved by a new Michigan-designed fish sorter now on trial in the state hatchery system.

The sorter separates fish into three or more sizes and early tests indicate at least 80 per cent of the labor involved in this chore will be eliminated.

One test showed a ton of fish - about 20,000 trout - could be sorted in 14 hours. Formerly, that many fish required five to six times as long to sort.
