Pamphlets dealing with the sex deviate and his approaches to children of school age were distributed recently to youngsters at Eagle, Bondi, Gilt, Ten Mile, Middeibelt, and German Elementary Schools.

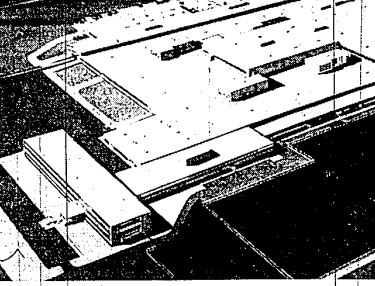
Distribution of the pamphlets was the first step in a three-phase program designed to educate the youngsters in methods used by sex deviates in their attempts to molest children, according to Earl Teeples, Franklin Knolls policeman who is in charge of the program. Prior to distribution of the pamphlets, the youngsters in schools discussed the situation with the youngsters and instructed them to take the pamphlets home and discuss them further with their parents.

The second phase of the program, Teeples said, is the showing of a film "Dangerous Strangers" again illustrating the dangers children face from sex deviates. A request from the Eagle School Parent Teachers Association to the Board of Education had already been made asking that the film be shown to children at attending school there, it was indicated. Gilt Good School has scheduled the showing of the film at the beginning of the next school year in September.

Upon being shown the movie, instruction on the third phase of the program will be given youngsters. This phase of training outlines the establishment of a "buddy system" under which a child is left alone at play or allowed to travel alone.

Doesn't he know that the medical profession has contributed more than its proportionate share of leaders outside the ranks of his own profession. We have Communists and out-right atheists teaching in our schools throughout the country, busy executives on many school boards, and we have those who are neither parents nor teachers holding office in PTA's. Why not a doctor on the local school board?

Wondering should go back to school to be briefed on American history. The charter of Rhode Island, adopted in 1663, contained the first definite declaration of the right to religious freedom. The Boston Tea Party of 1773 didn't do too badly on taxation without representation.

We are of the opinion that the first act of defiance of the ugliest word in the English language, dis-establishmentarianism, all along the line. Colonists emigrating to the United States brought with them the same religious intolerance from which they were supposedly escaping. From this provision it would appear that the school board may not set up bus routes specifically for private or parochial schools.

Woodcreek Couple Takes Extended Tour In Mexico, Find Numerous Sights And Events To Occupy Time

An extended visit to Mexico is a vacation which many of us may have a desire to take but few ever do. The Richard Norwalks of Wellington Road recently took such a tour, which lasted two months. The following is an account of their trip as told by Betty Mereshak, Woodcreek news correspondent. - Editor.

When the Richard Norwalks of Wellington Road returned home recently from a two-month trip to Mexico, they found that a squirrel had entered their activities room in some mysterious way and caused considerable damage. All the windows of the border they had been in were chewed up, two pieces of furniture were damaged, and the French doors were scarred, but all this did not diminish their enthusiasm in recounting the adventures of their trip.

The Norwalks left Farmington on March 9 and returned May 3, driving a total of 8200 miles. Before going south of the border they spent several days in Texas. There by pre-arrangement they met Nelson McCarthy, also of Wellington Road. He accompanied them to Mexico, traveling with them for a week. When Mr. McCarthy returned, Dick and Vera continued on to Mexico.

They traveled through Laredo and stopped in Valles where they stayed at the Tabular, a resort hotel famous for its thermomassage treatments and for the interesting experience of seeing Easter in Mexico. It was a five-day holiday. Everything closed on Holy Thursday and re-opened on the Tuesday after Easter.

The Norwalks hired an English-speaking cab driver to take them to the city. They reported that the city's roads were very good, and they were impressed by the modern progress. A beautiful new university was a point of interest. A few American-type super markets were very good, and they had the colorful outdoor markets, for which Mexico is famous, were very much in evidence as a definite part of their trip.

Most of the buying and selling is done in that manner. In their tour they visited numerous churches with richly ornate interiors. Among these was the Church of Guadalupe, where the rough, homespun mantle of Juan Diego, with its miraculous image of the Blessed Virgin, still hangs. The faithful come from all parts of the world to pray at the shrine. The Norwalks related that they were impressed by the devotion of the pilgrims who kneel and advance toward the church on their knees, saying the Rosary as they advanced.

Dick noted that Detroit street cars, all freshly painted, were going by fine business down there. Vera stated that she was impressed by the fact that every patio was surrounded by lush tropical flowers. Many of them were in flower and dark and filled the night air with exotic perfume.

In Taxco, where the Norwalks next visited, they found the streets very narrow and paved with cobblestones. In some areas the streets were so narrow that it is impossible for cars to pass.

It was there that the Norwalks saw two Mexican funerals. The caskets were painted wood, and were carried on two boards on the shoulders of four bearers. They walked up and down the cobblestone streets while a band played a farewell to the villagers.

Taxco is the silver center of Mexico and the hills are dotted with silver mines, some of which are now abandoned. Numerous shops selling silver jewelry and ornamental pieces were in evidence. In Taxco, next stop on the tour, the Norwalks stayed in a modern modern schools and hospitals and other public buildings indicate future progress. All the school children study the English language.

Although the average native is not rich in material things, he seems to have a happy, contented life. Families are very close and affectionate. Children are contented with a few dollars a week, and a blessing of the parents. Quarreling in families was unheard of, the Norwalks said, and an atmosphere of relaxed harmony seemed to prevail.

Tourist services are very reasonable. Dick said he got a haircut in a good hotel for 35 cents, with a manicure thrown in for a few cents more.

Children try to earn a few pesos by acting as guides. They can wash a car with just a small pan of water and do a beautiful job. Every child is a shoe shine boy.

The evening band concert in the village square was a big attraction in most communities. Dick attended a cock fight and a bull fight, but found both forms of entertainment distasteful.

The Norwalks watched a game of Jai-Alai, which is played with a wicker basket strapped to the arm and a light-tight ball is hurled back and forth.

On April 24 the Norwalks crossed the border to the United States. In Arizona they met an old friend, Bill Larson, who is secretary of the fruit growers association. Also, they met the Harvey Johnsons, a former Franklin couple who now run a saddle shop there. They arrived home, tanned and healthy, ready to settle down to Woodcreek life.

3,500 Roadside Tables Placed On State Highways

They call it an every-Saturday spray because it should be applied every seven days. For each gallon of water add three level teaspoons of methoxychlor, three of captan and two of malathion. Just mix and it's ready to apply on the trees.
