

# Five Seeking Three Seats On Farmington School Board

VERNON F. FISHER

A resident of the Farmington area for the past 14 years, Vernon F. Fisher of 28393 Wellington Road is a candidate for a three year term of office on the School Board. He has served as a trustee on the Board since December 8, 1935, when he was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Fayley Thompson.

Fisher, 53, who holds a bachelor of engineering degree from State University of Iowa, has been employed in the engineering profes-

sion since leaving college. For the past 20 years he has worked for the George A. Bass Construction Company and is a member of the Engineering Society of Detroit.

Prior to moving to Farmington, Mr. Fisher made his home for 15 years in Detroit. He is the father of three children: Margery, 26; Nancy, 21, and Mary, 16.

Mr. Fisher stated that he believes the major problem confronting the local School Board is that of providing adequate buildings and teachers to serve the district.

"The residents of the Farmington School District have recognized this problem and have done their part in providing the solution," he said. "It is now up to the Board of Education to wisely use the money that has been made available by the voters."

If elected, Fisher stated that he would spare no effort in carrying out that program with speed and economy.

LELAND G. CLIFFORD

A supervising accounting examiner with the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in Detroit for the past 28 years, Leland G. Clifford, who seeks a three year term on the School Board, has had experience in accounting, auditing, general company methods and personnel administration.

Clifford, 48, makes his home at 28310 Hillcrest and is the father of five children, Tom, 23; Loren, 20; Jim, 11; Dan, 10; and David, 4. The Cliffords have made their home here for the last eight years, having lived in Detroit for 18 years prior to that time.

A graduate of Gunnill College in Gunnville, Iowa, Clifford majored



in business administration and holds a bachelor of arts degree. Past president and a member of the Ten Mile P. T. A., Clifford has also been a member of the High School P. T. A. He is a member of the Institute of International Auditors.

Mr. Clifford indicated that he believes the major problems confronting the local School Board are providing and maintaining a full day educational program that will adequately meet the varying needs of our rapidly growing community at reasonable cost. He feels that this can be accomplished by careful long-range planning, skillful selection of facilities and personnel, and encouraging full knowledge and active interest of the people in the community as to the progress being made.

According to Clifford, the latter is necessary to enable both new and old residents of the community to fully realize the need for electing men and women to the Board who are qualified and vitally interested in a successful solution to its problems. "Everyone must feel that the progress and costs are satisfactory," Clifford concluded.

DR. JOSEPH GADBAW

Dr. Joseph J. Gadbow, a candidate for a three year term of office on the School Board, is a local physician and has been a resident of the community for the past 73 years. He makes his home at 28375 Oakland Avenue.

Dr. Gadbow, 39, is the father of five children: Joann, 11; Joseph, Jr., 10; R. Michael, 8; J. Patrick,

and Mary Susan, 11. Gadbow is a graduate of Hamilton College and the Syracuse University Medical School, and took post-graduate study in medicine at the University of Michigan. He is a member of the American Medical Association and the Alpha Kappa Kappa Medical Fraternity as well as the Oakland County and Michigan Medical Societies.

Prior to beginning his medical practice here, Dr. Gadbow served from 1940-1943 as a U. S. Medical Officer with the 93rd General Hospital in Germany.

When questioned relative to the major problem confronting the Farmington School District, Dr. Gadbow commented: "A large School District such as this one has a multitude of major problems. Even the simplest can be very complex when put up to debate. I will do my best, if elected, to be impartial and, above all, to be honest in my considerations."

JOSEPH F. McLUUGH

Joseph F. McHugh, 45, who makes his home at 32781 Eleven Mile Road, will seek election for a one year term of office on the School Board.

Employed with the J. L. Hudson Company for the past 21 years, he now serves as assistant manager at Hudson's Northland Center.

Mr. McHugh took special training at the Har- took special training at the Har-

vard Business School after graduating from the University of Detroit.

Prior to moving here a little over a year ago, the McHugh family made their home in Detroit where Mr. McHugh was born and raised.

McHugh served as a naval officer for 21 years. He is a past vice-commander of the 1st Marine Legion, a member of the Northland Center Chamber of Commerce, the Detroit Alumni Association, and the National Retail Dry Goods Association.

He is also an active member of the Farmington Community House Association.

McHugh has three children: Sharon, 16; Michael, 15; and Patrick, 14.

"It is my opinion that the major problem of the School Board is to provide the necessary full-time educational facilities for the rapidly increasing population in the Farmington area," McHugh stated. "Too many children are receiving a half-time education. McHugh continued, "and the Board must project a five or ten year plan to correct this situation. A budget must be formulated to carry out this program."

He contends that the School Board should work with the City Council and Township Board to promote a plan to attract high industry to the Farmington area to help alleviate the tax burden on the individual home owners.

BAYARD TUPPER

An incumbent seeking election to the Farmington School Board this year is Bayard Tupper of 3325 State Street, present treasurer of the Board. He is seeking election for the one-year term.

Information relative to his qualifications asked in a questionnaire sent out by the Enterprise was not returned and his qualifications, therefore, cannot be presented along with those of the other candidates.
