

RECORD POPPY SALE RETURNS REPORTED BY LEGION, V.F.W.

Record returns from the sale of Poppies and Buddy Poppies in the Farmington area prior to Memorial Day were reported this week by the American Legion Auxiliary and the V. F. W. and its Auxiliary.

The Legion Auxiliary reports collecting \$975 from the sale of Poppies. Two canisters are still out, which should swell the total to over the \$1,000 mark. Last year the group's sales totaled approximately \$750.

Final figures from the V. F. W. Auxiliary indicated a collection of \$918.61 from the sale of Buddy Poppies in both the Farmington and Clarencville areas. This is an increase of \$135.43 over last year when total collections were \$783.17.

ference with the Oakland County Drain Commissioner, plans are a being made for a survey of drainage along Gill Road. The Drain Commissioner has suggested a drainage district be set up for the construction of a storm sewer along the west side of Gill Road south to the Cut-Off. The survey is designed to determine cost estimates as well as the extent of the drainage area. Scherfitt stated that in his opinion, correction of the situation will greatly reduce the drainage problems along State Street and in the Alta Lakes Subdivision.

A request for the extension of city water to the new building of the Farmington Spivings and Loan, to be constructed near Orchard Lake and Ten Mile Roads in the Township, was denied by the Council. The denial of the request was based on the existing policy of the Council not to extend any further water service outside the City.

for before individual taxes can be computed. The state equalization factor for Farmington Township is 1.96302 and for the City of Farmington, 1.96617, Duncel stated.

Properly in Farmington Township assessed at \$4,000 will carry an equalized figure of \$7,852.08 (\$4,000 multiplied by the state equalization factor of 1.96302). This figure multiplied by 22.32 mills (the school tax rate for 1958) results in a tax of \$175.26.

DO-IT-YOURSELF CARPENTRY WORK INJURY RATE HIGH

Nearly twenty million American families residing mostly in single dwelling houses are now doing all or part of their home carpentry work. This figure is revealed in a nationwide survey of do-it-yourself activities completed recently by a nationally known insurance firm. As may be expected, the study also shows that carpentry produces the greatest number of do-it-yourself injuries.

Home woodworking activities, however, of furniture making or repairing, now cause more than 300,000 disabling injuries each year. The largest group of serious injuries resulted from ladder or scaffolding accidents.

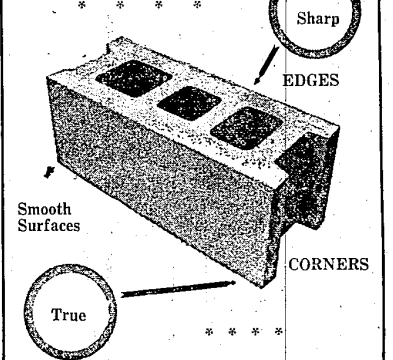
