ROTC Trainee At Griffiss Air Base

ROTC Cadet Millard M. Roberts, Jr., of Farmington, has been assigned to Griffiss Air Force Base at Rome, New York, for a one month encampment with the Reserve Officer Training Corps from Houghton, Michigan, Detachment 400.

Roberts, a student at the Houghton College of Mining and Technology, has had three years of ROTC training and will be commissioned in June of 1957.

The summer encampment is part of the Reserve Officer Training Corps curriculum and is usually attended during the third or fourth year of college.

Base facilities will be utilized and many opportunities offered for training in particular areas, such as operations, weather, maintenance and supply. However, all possible emphasis will be placed on orientation toward the primary Air Force weapon—the aircraft—and its role in the mission of the Air Force. Each cadet will be given a minimum of three to four hours of flying.

MICHIGAN GOOD ROADS FEDERATION ANALYZING ROAD NEEDS, FISCAL REPORTS

The president of the Michigan Good Roads Federation, James M. Telford of Lansing, recently announced the appointment of a committee to analyze Michigan's present road needs and the new Federal aid program.

The committee will compile any recommended changes in state highway, road and street laws to provide the most equitable and effective road building program for Michigan.

Appointed to the committee were Charles M. Ziegler, commissioner, and George M. Foster, deputy commissioner, Michigan State Highway Department; John Huss, director, Michigan Municipal League; C. C. Richards, commissioner, Department of Public Works, Detroit; Otto S. Hess, superintendent, Kent County Road Commission; John Jacoby, legal division, Wayne County Road Commission; C. J. Carroll, executive secretary, Michigan Road Builders Association; Gilbert Haley, executive vice president, Michigan Automobile Dealers Association; Oscar G. Olander, secretary Michigan Trucking Association; Stanley M. Powell, Michigan Farm Bureau.

George Swartz, Grand Rapids; George Ames, Michigan Bell Telephone Company; and D. B. Varnier, Michigan State University.

"Though Michigan's engineering needs and fiscal reports have been completed for several months all changes hinged upon what the Federal Government was going to do in regards to highways," he said. "Now that the measure is passed, we must meet our responsibilities."

The engineering needs study, he said, involved 300 engineers statewide, and showed Michigan's highway, road and street needs to be \$5.7 billion dollars for the period 1955 to 1975. The fiscal study done in conjunction pointed out that Michigan could meet its needs if the Federal road bill became a reality, and if the legislature then changed the formula for distributing money to the counties, municipalities and state highway department.

Under the changed formula of distribution of road funds, the counties and cities could possibly receive as high as \$15 million additional funds annually.


