

## DeMarco Finishes Six-Month Cruise

David J. DeMarco, fireman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. DeMarco of 2147 Collingwood Street, Farmington, arrived in Long Beach, California, July 8 aboard the heavy cruiser USS Columbus, which had recently completed a six-month cruise of the 7th Fleet in Far Eastern waters.

The Columbian participated in task force operations and amphibious landing exercises and made good-will visits to Swettenham and Penang, Malaya; Zamboanga and Manila in the Philippines; Hong Kong; and the Japanese ports of Yokosuka, Nagasaki and Sasebo.

The 43,000 mile tour took the vessel twice across the 180th Meridian and the Equator, making all hands on board Golden, Dragons and Shells back.

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## First Federal Assets Up 17 Million In 6 Months

Assets of First Federal Savings of Detroit increased over 17 million dollars during the six months ending June 30, to a new total of more than 100 million dollars, reports James Gehrkne, Jr., president of the organization.

Four Senators are vying for their seats to fill the three available positions: George R. Coleman (R-Belle Isle), Cora M. Brown (R-Detroit), and William S. Broome (R-Royal Oak) are seeking Congressional nominations. Fred Nicholson (D-Warren) is a candidate for Circuit Judge at Macomb.

A dozen House members will be leaving: Reps. T. Jameson Hodge (D-1st), George C. Stech (D-Michigan City), and Fred W. Zinn (R-Battle Creek) are running for seats in the senate.

Rep. Richard C. Van Dusen (R-Birmingham) is an announced candidate for the Republican nomination as Attorney-General. Rep. Charles J. Golden (R-Monroe) seeks to become Monroe County Prosecutor.

Joseph E. Warner (R-Ypsilanti), who held the longest tenure in the House of any member, died recently.

Rep. Fred G. Beardsley (R-Oxford), Richard G. Smith (R-Bay City), Joseph A. Cavanaugh (R-Midland), John J. McCune (R-East Lansing), Hugh D. Johnson (R-Rosebush), and Speaker Wade Van Valkenburg (R-Kalamazoo) are retiring.

## PLAN NEW LAWNS, RESEEDING OF OLD NOW, SAYS EXPERT

It's not too soon to think about making a new lawn even though August is still almost a month away. August 15 to September 1 is the best time to seed a lawn in Oakland County, according to Assistant County Agricultural Agent Wayne Siebert.

In the meantime, there are several things necessary to be ready when seeding time comes. Details on making a new lawn are included in a new Extension folder just received in the Oakland County Extension Office.

James Tyson of the Michigan State University soil science department wrote the folder which is number 100. Grading, drainage, soil requirements, seedbed preparation, grass and seeding recommendations are explained in this publication.

For tips on caring for an established lawn, County Agent Siebert recommends another Extension folder, F-212, just published at MSU. Copies of both F-212 and F-212 are available at the County Extension Office, 1200 West Boulevard, Pontiac.
