Transportation Servc Opened Between Franklin Knolls, Northland

According to information received last week, arrangements have been made between Franklin Knolls Subdivision and Suburban Shoppers, Inc., of Birmingham, for Volkswagen transportation between Franklin Knolls and Northland Shopping Center. The service is being set up on a trial basis. If operation of the service is successful it will be expanded, if not, it will be discontinued.

Four stops are scheduled in the Knolls for the trial period. They will be made at the intersections of Glouchster and Tarneyton, Lochmoor and Queensboro, Briarcrest and Lochmoor, and Briarcrest and Fourteen Mile Road. Riders from Fourteen Mile Road, north of Fourteen Mile Road, will be accommodated at the Briarcrest - Fourteen Mile Road stop.

The Volkswagen seats ten persons one time.

Four round trips are scheduled in the morning and three in the afternoon for the trial period. The route to Northland will follow Fourteen Mile, Middlebelt and Northwestern.

Buses will leave the Knolls on the hour from 7 through 11 a.m.

HIGGINS TO OPEN OFFICE IN COUNTY IF HE IS ELECTED
Supervisors of 19 Oakland County Townships honored Republican Congressional candidate George N. Higgins at a luncheon last week at the Old Mill Tavern in Waterford.

They heartily endorsed Higgins' open a permanent Oakland County 18th Congressional District office to provide local service if elected to Congress in the fall election.

"I plan to open and staff an office right here in Oakland County if elected Congressman to provide local service and information on the spot instead of by long distance telephone or by letter in Washington," Higgins said.

"Local citizens with inquiries about federal legislation that affects them will be served as well as local organizations, civic, fraternal and veterans groups, and local business and industry."

Higgins also asked the rural supervisors their views on the farm price situation and agreed to set up a local advisory committee to provide him with local sentiment to guide his legislative efforts if elected.

Higgins served eight years on the Oakland County Board of Supervisors from the City of Ferndale. He later served three terms in the State House of Representatives and four terms in the Michigan Senate from Oakland County.

The luncheon was organized by Floyd Andrews of Independence Township, former chairman of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors.

Maas of 26275 Drake Road, Farmington, are serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Saratoga, world's largest and most powerful ship.

The carrier returned to New York June 28 after successfully completing her first sea trials and is scheduled to begin her "shake-down" cruise in the Caribbean on July 30.

In keeping with the Navy's new strategy to provide the nation with mobile air bases that cannot be singled out by inter-continental missiles, the Saratoga can change its position more than 600 miles in a single day, and will carry more than 100 of the latest jet aircraft.

Franklin Knolls Sump Pump Service Terminated

Shall the following described territory in Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, be incorporated as a Village under the provisions of Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended:

WHEREAS, heretofore on March 28, 1955, pursuant to Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, a petition was filed by certain resident electors and freeholders of the area, praying for the incorporation of the territory described as:

SECTION 12, Town 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan. A portion thereof has been subdivided; said subdivisions are more particularly known and described as follows, to-wit:

(a) "Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms", a part of the north half of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55, Page 34, of Plats, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(b) "Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms, No. 1", a part of Section 12, as per the Plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Pages 35A and 35B, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(c) "Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms Addition", a part of the southwest quarter of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Page 32, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(d) "Supervisor's Plat No. 9", a part of the southwest quarter of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 54 of Plats, Page 32, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(e) "Westmont", a subdivision of part of the northwest quarter of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Page 48, Oakland County, Michigan, Records, as a Village, said Village to be known and designated as the "Village of Wood Creek Farms;" and

That the form and sufficiency of the petition heretofore filed on March 28, 1955, praying for the submission of the question of incorporation of the Village to be known as "Wood Creek Farms" to consist of the territory described in said petition, complies with the provisions of the Act being Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, and are in all respects regular;

That August 7, 1956, be set as the date for a Special Election on the question of incorporating the Village of Wood Creek Farms.
