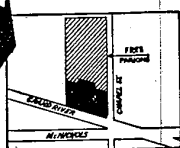

Additions to the Brighton High School will be constructed by the Wallace Construction Company of Farmington.

The additions, designed by H. E. Beyer and Associates, Inc., Detroit architectural-engineering firm, consist of four classrooms, an activities room, teachers lounge, rest rooms, janitor's closet and storage room, a new corridor and alterations to the existing buildings.

General construction features are designed to blend with the previous addition, built in 1954. Construction will be one-story steel frame; masonry walls and metal roof deck.

Construction work is now under way.
