Cubs Defeat Tigers In Extra-Inning Thriller, Take First In League

In an eleven inning thriller in the Farmington Little League Saturday, the Star Cutter Cubs took sole possession of first place by defeating the Farmington State Bank Tigers 9-6. It was the longest game of the season and the second time the Cubs have taken the measure of the Tigers in extra innings.

The game also was noteworthy in that it was the first game played this season in which the players were limited to 9, 10, and 11 years old. Terry McDowell and Danny McKelvey, both 10 year olds, were the starting pitchers and left the game with the score tied at the end of six innings at 5 to 5.

The Cubs' relief hurler was 9 year old Bob Radtke, who did a fine job and received credit for the victory. Tommy Cunilio, also 9 years old, pitched the last five innings for the Tigers and also turned in a very creditable performance.

In the first game of last Saturday's double bill, the Curt Hall Cards defeated the Farmington Dairy Yanks 14-3. Ten year old Don Davis, making his first appearance of the season on the hill for the Cards, limited his opponents to five hits.

Trailing by one run going into the bottom of the sixth inning, the Cubs on Monday evening scored two runs to defeat the Cards 8-7. Darryl Allen, who relieved George Giffin in the fifth inning, received credit for the victory.

Scoring eleven runs in the first inning, the Tigers went on to defeat the Yanks 19-3 on Tuesday evening. Glenn Chaisson allowed only four hits and was credited with the victory. Paul Riggio of the Tigers hit a grand slam home run in the big first inning. Mike Mantoris continued his heavy hitting for the Yanks by belting a home run in the second inning.

Behind the three-hit pitching of Gary MacLean, the Tigers shut out the Cards 5-0 on Wednesday evening. Tommy Thomas pitched a fine game for the losers, allowing only five hits, but had poor support in the field.

The Cubs defeated the Yanks 10-2 on Thursday evening behind the no-hit pitching of Darryl Allen and Jim Stroup. Allen worked the first four innings and received credit for his second victory of the week.

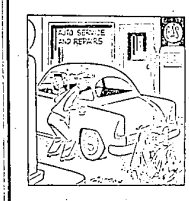
