'Guys And Dolls' To Open For Two Week Run At Melody Circus July 23

Others who will portray the pungent characters from Damon Runyon's famous stories about dead-beats and sharpers of the great white way, will be Oggy Small and Lew Herbert, of the New York and London companies of the original production, Brutus Peck, Sammy Smith and Clarence Nordstrom. Included in this gallery are such beloved rogues from Runyon's collection of underworld denizens as Nicely-Nicely Johnson, Benny Southstreet, Harry the Horse, Big Jule and Angle the Ox. TEN POINT PROGRAM OUTLINED TO CUT TRAFFIC FATALITIES

The automobile death rate is threatening to reach an all-time high -- an estimated 41,000 traffic deaths for the year 1956, according to a booklet published recently by the American Mutual Liability Company.

The booklet issues a warning that if the death rate of one every thirteen minutes is to be reduced, ten critical needs outlined below must be met:

1. Continue pressure for new highway construction and the widening, straightening and repairing of secondary roads.
2. Support driver training courses. Only 11 states have top-level driving courses for high school students.
3. Establish an effective, state automobile inspection program in every state.
4. Abolish all ticket-fixing.
5. Help the community to organize all its agencies into a coordinated force for safer driving.
6. Expand traffic policing forces.
7. Encourage nation-wide adoption of uniform traffic laws.
8. Believe in and practice courtesy on the highway.
9. Encourage safety engineers and others concerned to turn their attention to safe car design and construction.
10. Let every driver know how to control and respect the power at his command; let him learn what causes accidents and how to avoid them; let him learn the rules of the road and obey them.

New Instrument To Aid Partially Blind On Display

A new instrument to aid the partially blind in reading has been developed with a financial grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation by the Franklin Institute Laboratories for Research and Development.

A model of the projection magnifier is now on display in Farmington at the office of Dr. M. L. Hutton, optometrist.

The instrument, known as the AO Projection Magnifier, is a compact, efficient, portable, self-contained unit. It accommodates all standard types of reading materials, including letters, newspapers, magazines, and even thick textbooks.

The reading material is placed on a two-way movable platform. A counter-balance optical head is brought into contact with the printed page. The illuminated, magnified image of the page is clearly projected onto the built-in, 41 inch by 19 inch reading screen.

The instrument uses a readily available 40 watt bulb and there is no danger of overheating, even after hours of continuous use.

The projection magnifier is available in two models - 1 one which magnifies three times original print size and one which gives five times magnification, which is required for some special cases.

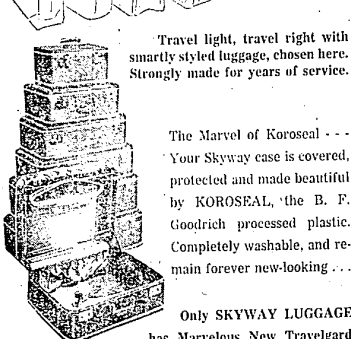
