TO VOTE ON THE FOLLOWING VILLAGE INCORPORATION PROPOSAL:

Shall the following described territory in Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, be incorporated as a Village under the provisions of Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended:

SECTION 12, Town 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan. A portion thereof has been subdivided; said subdivision is more particularly known and described as follows, to-wit:

(a) "Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms", a part of the north half of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55, Page 34, of Plats, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(b) "Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms, No. 1", a part of Section 12, as per the Plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Pages 32A and 33B, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(c) "Supervisor's Plat of Wood Creek Farms Addition", a part of the southwest quarter of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Page 32, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(d) "Supervisor's Plat No. 9", a part of the southwest quarter of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Page 32, Oakland County, Michigan, Records.

(e) "Westmost", a subdivision of part of the northwest quarter of said Section 12, as per the plat thereof recorded in Liber 55 of Plats, Page 49, Oakland County, Michigan, Records, as a Village, said Village to be known and designated as the "Village of Wood Creek Farms" and

That the form and sufficiency of the petition heretofore filed on March 25, 1955, praying for the submission of the question of incorporation of the Village to be known as "Wood Creek Farms" to consist of the territory described in said petition, complies with the provisions of the Act being Act 278 of the Public Acts of 1909, as amended, and are in all respects regular.

That August 7, 1956, be set as the date for a Special Election on the question of incorporating the Village of Wood Creek Farms.

ELECTION LAW, ACT 116, P. A. 1954

Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

(Continued from Page 1B) child, he attends the fifth grade of Primary School and Sunday School regularly. He looks healthy and strong although he has gland trouble in the past. When he grows up, he would like to be a captain in the Navy. He has no toys.

Since its origin, the Foster Parents' Plan has aided more than 75,000 children. It is now operating in Belgium, England, France, Western Germany, Greece, Holland, Italy and Korea, and is helping unfortunate and impoverished children of fifteen different nationalities without regard to race or creed.

It maintains a field headquarters in each country with a director who is responsible for the overall administration of assistance to the children on Plan rolls and for their periodic re-investigations.

Foster Parents' Plan is a non-profit, non-sectarian, independent, government-approved relief organization which, according to its by-laws, provides for the "care, maintenance, education, training and well-being of children orphaned and distressed and otherwise made destitute." It does not do mass relief; each child is treated as an individual. "Adoption" is financial, not legal. The Foster Parent merely promises to contribute \$15 monthly toward the child's support for at least one year. Of this sum the child receives \$9 each month as an outright cash grant. The remainder is made up of periodic food and new clothing packages. Furthermore, any special needs of the child are taken care of.

In return, the Foster Parent receives a brief history of the child and a photograph, and correspondence through the Plan office is encouraged with letters translated both ways, since the children need the feeling of being loved and belonging to someone, someplace.

Honored As All 'A' Student At MSU

Loren Richard Clifford of 33630 Hillcrest, Farmington, was listed among a group of 344 students at Michigan State University who achieved an all "A" academic record during the Spring term of studies at the university.

The group will be honored, along with summer school students who received all "A" records, at a dinner to be given by President John A. Hannah. Clifford's name and the names of all other perfect record students will be placed on an honor roll which reads "In recognition of the high attainment of scholarship during the Spring session."

Clifford is a junior at MSU and is majoring in philosophy.

ing policy on test blocks, and mounted in experimental aircraft. Fantastic Developments! All the things I saw and heard cannot be made public at this time. But it can be said with the utmost emphasis that America leads the world today in (1) military defensive and striking power, and (2) in the field of scientific advancement. Fantastic military developments, on which we have not leaked out, already have come out of research labs and through testing experiments, and are becoming available for use. And the whole scientific horizon in America is broadening with astonishing speed. "In American research," observed a man whose company is engaged in some of the newest research projects, "even atomic energy and its vast potential usage already has taken a back seat to the approach of solar energy and the promising potential of cosmic energy."

At a time when the Communist conspiracy is grasping for world domination we must not become

unsold on the power and capability of America. The American system's individual freedom creates the best possible atmosphere for scientific progress and our private ownership economy is the most dynamic productive force on earth. We must use our great power and potential to deal firmly and courageously with the tricky maneuverings of the Communist world-wide conspiracy.
