



# C-C President Gives Challenge For Golf Cup

Southfield Chamber of Commerce President Floyd Yocke doesn't intend to let the Farmington Chamber of Commerce walk away with the president's cup this year.

Yocke let it be known in a letter that he personally intends to take up the mantle and restore the golfing trophy to the Southfield Chamber.

The president's cup is the award given during the annual golf and dinner outing co-sponsored by the Southfield and Farmington chambers.

Last year, Yocke says, Farmington won the trophy by default but this year things will be different.

The outing will be July 6 at Glen Oaks Golf and Country Club, on 10 Mile between Middle Belt and Orchard Lake roads in Farmington Township.

"I'm going out to bring the cup back to Southfield where it rightfully belongs," Yocke said in his letter to Farmington Chamber President William Flattery.

"I've even been practicing and pursuing a rigid training schedule, particularly on the 18th hole."

Neither president will give out any information on just how good a golfer he is and both said that there will be no handicapping.

"I'm going to win with golf clubs, not with a pencil," declares Yocke.

Golf for chamber members and guests may be scheduled between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. Green fees, which include 18 holes of play, shower and locker facilities, are \$8.

In the evening, a dinner-dance is planned with cocktails at 6:30 p.m., dinner at 7:30 and dancing beginning at 9 p.m. to music of the Danny Baker Trio. Dinner tickets are \$12 per person.

## Policy On Traffic Tickets Unchanged

FARMINGTON Motorists within the jurisdiction of Farmington's 47th District Court needn't worry about that decision of a week ago by three Birmingham area judges that they will not issue arrest warrants for those who ignore parking tickets.

Judge Michael Hand has no intention of going along with the interpretation of the law set forth by his judicial colleagues, Judges Carl Ingraham, Alice Gilbert and Gus Giffell for the communities of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield and West Bloomfield townships, Orchard Lake, Keego Harbor and Sylvan Lake.

"I plan to enforce the law just as I have before," said Hand, whose 47th district includes courtrooms in two city halls - Farmington and what now becomes Farmington Hills.

"The illegal parking of a car is a misdemeanor of itself," said the judge in refutation of the philosophy forth to the north which, in essence, is that unless the policeman who tickets an illegally parked car sees the owner park the car, the car owner can't be prosecuted.

Ingraham, a former member of the Oakland County board of supervisors; was quoted: "You can't issue an arrest warrant when there isn't anybody with personal knowledge to testify about the offense."

To this, Presiding Judge Andrew C. Wood of Detroit Traffic Court and other authorities on Michigan automotive law pointed out that an owner's responsibility for his car was upheld in a State Supreme Court many years ago.

This is what led Hand's statement: "The illegal parking of a car is a misdemeanor of itself."

Farmington City Manager Robert Deadman went along with the Hand interpretation, pointing out from his police background that there is a myriad of illegal parking possibilities - in fire lanes, etc. - and that the courts long have held responsibility pertaining to a parked vehicle to be that of the registered owner.

One published report said Birmingham officials "expressed shock" over the District Court pronouncement that arrest warrants in such cases must require that the officer who issues the ticket sees who parks the vehicle.

Judge Hand has assured motorists and governmental authorities alike that no such shock waves will echo through Farmington.
