## County Offers Immunization For Children

FARMINGTON Free immunization for all children from age three through high school is being offered by the Oakland County Department of Health.

This will include either the primary series or boosters for diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, poliomyelitis, rubella measles, German measles and tuberculosis tests.

These can be obtained at the First Methodist Church, Warner and Grand River in Farmington, from 9 a.m. until 12 noon on Thursday, July 12.

They also are available regularly at the South Oakland Health Dept., 27725 Greenfield Rd., Southfield, from 8:30 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

No appointment is necessary, but previous immunization records should be brought in.

**ORDINANCE NO. 58**  
**TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON NORTHWEST SECTION WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM ORDINANCE**  
An Ordinance to provide for the connection of premises to the Oakland County Water Supply System in Farmington Township, Northwest Section, Oakland County, Michigan. To provide for the imposition, collection and enforcement of fees for connection thereon and for charges for water supply service thereon.  
Section 1. Definitions.  
Whoever used in this ordinance, except where otherwise indicated by the context:  
1.01 The term "Township" shall be construed to mean the Township of Farmington and its successors and the term "County" shall be construed to mean the County of Oakland, both in the State of Michigan.  
1.02 The term "boards" shall be construed to mean the legislative and governing body of the Township and the term "Department" shall be construed to mean the Oakland County Department of Public Works created pursuant to 1967 PA 136 as amended.  
1.03 The term "water supply district" or "district" shall be construed to mean Oakland County Water Supply District in Farmington Township, Northwest Section.  
1.04 The term "water supply system" shall be construed to mean the Oakland County Water Supply System in Farmington Township, Northwest Section and all extensions, enlargements and improvements thereto in the area served by the Northwest Section.  
1.05 The term "premises" shall be construed to refer to the lands included within the boundaries of a single description as set forth from time to time on the general tax rolls of the Township as a single taxable item in the name of a taxpayer or taxpayers at one address and in the case of planted lots shall be limited to a single planted lot unless an existing building or structure is also located on more than one lot as to make the same a single description or purposes of assessment or conveyance or otherwise.  
1.06 The term "water supply services" shall be construed to refer to the transportation, metering, pumping and delivery of water to the water supply system or to a beneficiary connected thereto, or indirectly, to the water supply system.  
1.07 The term "unit" shall be construed to mean any premises or portions of premises to which there is available or deliverable the quantity of water or portion thereof as set forth on the capacity of a fire hydrant, based on a single family of ordinary size as which occupied by such a single family.  
1.08 The term "charge" or "charges" shall be construed to mean the amount charged at the time and in the amount provided, for each premises in the district for connecting directly or indirectly to the system, for water use and availability, for debt service and for periodic maintenance.  
Section 2. The Ordinance.  
2.01 This Ordinance shall be used for the transportation and delivery of water to the water supply system, directly or indirectly, and for the use of water therefrom for all purposes shall be in compliance with the Ordinance and with the standards and regulations of the City of Detroit, the County and the Township applicable thereto.  
2.02 Except as otherwise provided, water to be furnished by the system to each premises shall be made to the respective premises as follows:  
2.03 Water Connections Charge. A quarterly charge for water service shall be made to each premises connected to the system in the amount of \$15 per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumed, with a minimum quarterly charge of \$5.  
2.04 Meter Service Charge. A monthly meter service charge shall be made to each premises connected to the system in accordance with the following schedule but shall be payable quarterly:

1/2 inch .45  
3/4 inch .60  
1 inch 1.00  
1 1/4 inches 1.75  
2 inches 2.50  
2 1/2 inches 3.50  
3 inches 4.50  
3 1/2 inches 5.50  
4 inches 6.50  
4 1/2 inches 7.50  
5 inches 8.50  
5 1/2 inches 9.50  
2.05 Capital Charge. A charge of \$200.00 per unit, up to a maximum of 100 units (\$20,000.00) shall be made to each premises connected directly or indirectly to the system. This charge shall be paid in cash or time application made for a connection permit. In the case of any premises connected to the Detroit Water System or any other existing public or community water system at the time when any extension is adopted such charge may be paid in thirty (30) equal quarterly installments of \$4.00 per month. Capital charges for all premises located within portions of land to be subdivided and developed for single or multiple residential purposes and which will be connected to the water supply system shall be made in accordance with the Agreement of February 1, 1972, shall be paid in full as a condition precedent to connection to said portion of the system.  
2.06 Debt Service Charge. An annual debt service charge of \$20.00 per unit for the first 25 units and \$10.00 per unit for additional units shall be made to each premises connected to the system, which shall be payable quarterly.

repair the permit holder shall pay the deficit.  
Section 3. Lien.  
3.01 All connections furnished by the system in any premises shall be a lien thereon, and on September 1 of each year the person or agency charged with the management of said system, shall certify any such charges which have been delinquent as its month or more to the Township Supervisor who shall enter the same upon the next tax roll against the premises to which such services shall have been rendered, and other charges shall be collected and said lien shall be enforced in the same manner as provided in respect to taxes assessed on such charge against any premises, and the Board is so notified in writing, with a true copy of the list of the affected premises of three to be sent annually, together with the amount of such charges, to the Township Supervisor and after the date of such notice, however, in event of the filing of such notice, no lien shall be enforced against the premises to which such premises until a fourth report equal to twice the average quarterly charges to such premises shall have been made as security for the payment of charges thereon.  
Section 4. Fiscal Year.  
4.01 The system shall be operated upon the basis of a fiscal year beginning on January 1 of each year and ending on December 31 of the following year.  
Section 5. County as Operating Agency.  
5.01 The operation, maintenance and management of the Northwest Section of the County water supply system in the Township, shall be under the immediate supervision and control of the County as agent for the Township and the County as such agent acting through its Department shall collect on behalf of and as agent for the Township all charges payable pursuant hereto.  
Section 10. Connection to System.  
10.01 No cross connections shall be permitted, made, maintained or continued hereafter between any part of the system and any other water supply facilities nor any other source of water, private or public, be constructed or installed connected with any facilities of the system or with water mains, lines, pipes, plumbing or appliances which are connected to the system or to which water supplied by the system flows or can flow.  
10.02 All connections made directly or indirectly to the system shall be made only after a permit therefor has been obtained and shall be constructed only with workmanship of such materials as are approved by the Township and also in compliance with the requirements and regulations of the County and the City of Detroit which shall be available at all times in the office of the Township Clerk and at the offices of the Department and shall be sanctioned on any water connection permit issued by the Township or the Department.  
10.03 By connecting premises to the system the owner thereof irrevocably grants to the Township and the Department the right to enter at all reasonable times on or to the premises for the purpose of reading meters and inspecting, repairing and maintenance of water mains and water use facilities on or to the premises.  
10.04 The provisions of this Ordinance shall be enforced through the Department of Public Works and the Department of Public Works, in any Court having jurisdiction. Any violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be a nuisance per se.  
10.05 Violation of any of the provisions of Section 10 of this Ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor and any person or persons found guilty thereof shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100.00 for each offense and \$10.00 per day for each day thereafter, but not to exceed \$1,000.00 for each offense.  
Section 11. Severability Clause.  
11.01 Should any section, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance be declared by the Court to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance, and the Court shall construe this Ordinance as if the invalid portion had never been included.  
Section 12. Repealer.  
12.01 All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict hereto are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.  
Section 13. Effective Date.  
13.01 The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after publication in the manner prescribed by law.  
Section 14. Adoption.  
14.01 This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been passed by the Township Board of the Township of Farmington at a meeting held on the 26th day of June, 1973, and ordered to be published in the manner prescribed by law.
