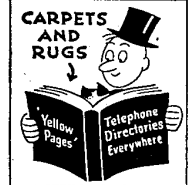
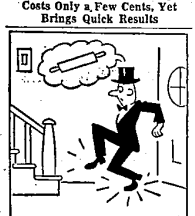

### POLICE TAKING PHOTOS OF TRAFFIC LAW VIOLATIONS

Two Michigan state police unmarked patrol cars have been put into operation equipped with cameras with which pictures will be taken of more flagrant traffic violations to prove that they occurred. They are presently assigned to the Brighton and East Lansing posts.

The Brighton car is equipped with a Polaroid camera, which develops a picture instantly. The finished print can be shown to a violator even while the officer is issuing the ticket.

The other car has a movie camera with which one picture, or frame, can be taken at a time or a moving sequence. In this case, however, the film must be developed and printed later.

The cars will be used only in the daytime, which is also the policy with respect to other unmarked patrol vehicles operated by the department. The cameras are so set that only one officer in a car is necessary.

While use of the cameras is somewhat experimental, the pictures will not only be of value as evidence when drivers protest that they did not commit the offenses, but will also provide a record of how violations occur and how they can be caused.

After a period at Brighton and East Lansing, the cars will be rotated among all the posts.

## SAFETY MEASURES URGED TO PREVENT CHILDREN FROM ACCIDENTS IN HOME

More accidents occur in the home than anywhere else with the exception of the auto lanes. In 30 cities accidental deaths in the home exceed motor vehicle fatalities, according to a report issued recently by a national insurance company.

Take stock of your family's safety needs and fill them just as you would make out the grocery list. Keeping your family safe from mishaps is as important as keeping them well fed.

Youngsters will be spending more time on the porch and in the backyard this time of the year. Safeguard those places for them. For the smaller ones, have a railing on the porch and safety gates at the top and bottom of stairs.

Make sure the yard is cleared of stones and sticks.

Falls account for half of home accidents, make up your mind that you're going to be firm about your youngsters putting their bicycles, roller skates, bats and balls away after use.

Retain a firm attitude on safety measures regarding your own activities. Rakes, hoes, lawnmowers and other garden and lawn equipment belong out of the way when not in use.

Although more time will be spent outdoors, remember that vigilance inside is a year-around need.

Have a light at the porch steps, both end of the stairs, the hall, near the bed and between the bed

rooms and bathrooms.

Convert all throw rugs into anchored rugs - especially at stairways, bedroom and bathroom.

Make sure you have a good sturdy step ladder available for out of reach tasks. Boxes, crates, tubs and tin cans are poor substitutes and pulling put a drawer to stand on can be suicide.

Along with falls, eliminate burns and poisoning dangers. You can do this by keeping matches and other items that can lead to fire out of reach of children. Be especially sure that medicines, plant sprays, insecticides, lye, ammonia and other cleaning and polishing materials are locked in a special place.

Apply knowledge and common sense when, despite all care, things do happen. For all injuries, it is best to summon a physician. However, it's well to know and practice basic first aid until the doctor arrives.

It's wise to know what to do in emergencies, but it is wisest to prevent them. Prepare your home safely-wise.

Nobody was inconvenienced much though. Repair crew went right to work—and things were fixed up in jig time.

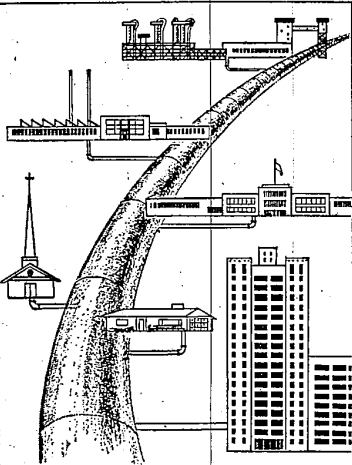
Incidentally, the water company got a flood of payments on overdue bills that day. Lots of "forgetful" folks must have figured they were being warned!
