Contract For New US-16 Bridge To Be Let Aug. 22

Low bidder on the construction of a bridge to carry the Brighton-Farmington Expressway (US-16 relocation) over the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad about a half mile northwest of Novi will be determined in Lansing on August 22, the State Highway Department disclosed.

The reinforced-concrete and steel bridge will have two bridge decks separated by a 33 foot 7 inch open median. Each deck will be 252 feet in length with a 42-foot wide roadway, a 13-foot wide safety curb and a 2-foot wide sidewalk.

Completion of the bridge has been scheduled for November 30, 1957.

Select State Fair Sunrise Service Speaker

One of the outstanding Christian leaders in the world, Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, president of the National Council of Churches of Christ, will be the speaker for the sixth annual Sunrise Service to be held Sunday, September 2, at 8 a.m. at the Michigan State Fair.

For the past five years, the Sunrise Service has been sponsored by the State Fair in cooperation with the Detroit Council of Churches.

STATE POLICE NEARLY DOUBLE JUNE 1955 ARRESTS

The Michigan State Police nearly doubled arrests in June over the same month a year ago with a total of 24,371, an increase of 91 per cent.

Of the arrests, 22,835 were for traffic offenses, but the total does not include 837 juvenile traffic offenders and delinquent and wayward minors.

The increase was largely attributed to more manpower, 257 additional troopers having been put into service since June of 1954.

Department vehicles traveled 1,450,242 miles in all activities. In addition, troopers made 27,708 property and 4,695 liquor inspections.

The identification bureau received 10,292 sets of fingerprints during the month, of which 4,462 were non-criminal.

Fingerprints of applicants to carry concealed weapons numbered 843. Of these, 88 were identified with criminal records. Identification of 28 wanted persons also was made through fingerprints.

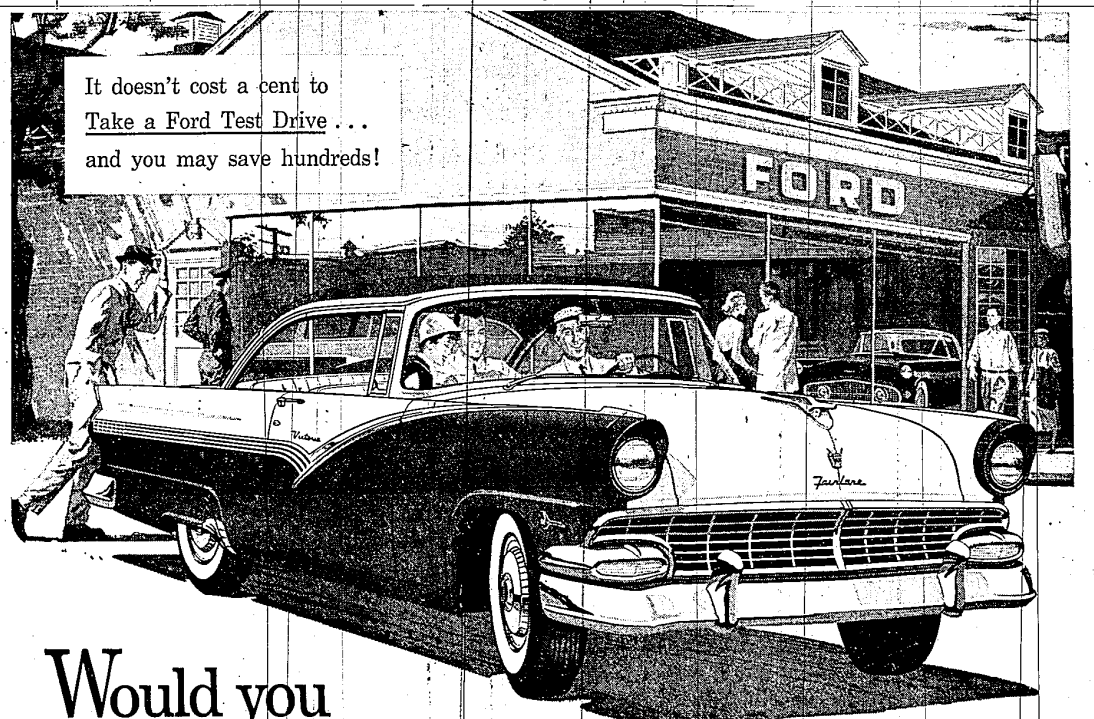
