

Novi Rebekahs Planning Pancake Breakfast

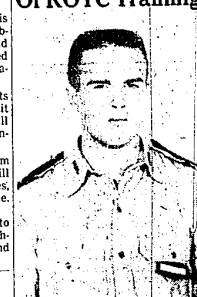

Edison Opens New Oakland District Office

Dedication ceremonies Tuesday, August 14, marked the completion of Detroit Edison's new combined Oakland district headquarters and local customer office. The modern one-story office building, located at West Huron and Pine Streets in Pontiac, opened for business on August 15.

Howard L. Canfield, manager of Edison's Oakland district, said the new building will house district headquarters offices as well as a customer office to serve the Pontiac area.

Canfield said the new office had been designed to provide a maximum of comfort and convenience for Edison customers and employees. He noted that the most unusual feature was the installation of five heat pumps which cool the building in summer without water and warm it in the winter without fuel.

Other features of the new 5,400 square-foot building include extensive use of glass and aluminum on the front; specially designed interior lighting; decorative photo murals; and the latest in office furniture and fixtures.

The new office, which has been under construction since January, replaces the white frame building which the company occupied for 26 years.

When Edison opened its first Pontiac office in 1930, there were about 5,000 Detroit Edison electric meters in the county. Today, the company has about 200,000 meters and serves about 577,000 people. By 1970, the company will be serving nearly 850,000 Oakland County people, according to Edison forecasts.

FAIR TO OFFER PHOTO CONTEST FOR CHILDREN

This year the Michigan State Fair will hold a photographic contest for children only - 14 years and under.

Cash prizes of \$10, \$7.50 and \$5 plus two tickets to the Coliseum and Grandstand shows will be awarded in each of four classifications.

The contest is for black and white prints only.

The general classification has two divisions: Rural Michigan at Work or Play and Urban Michigan at Work or Play. The Fair content classification also has two divisions: Opening Day Parade and the State Fair Proper.

Two prints may be submitted in each classification, one in either division or two in one division. In other words, each contestant may enter up to four prints. They must not be smaller than 4" x 5" or larger than 11" x 14".

All entries must be delivered or mailed to Photography Contest, Administration Building, Detroit 8, Michigan, by noon of Sunday, September 2.

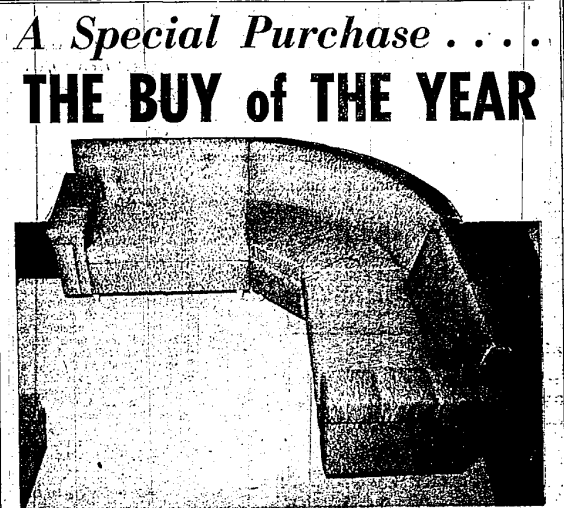
The contestant should attach his or her name, address, age, telephone number, the classification and division. All entries will become the property of the State Fair.

Children entering the Opening Day Parade and State Fair Proper divisions on Friday, August 31, opening day, may have their developing and printing done free of charge by Cunningham Drugs if they deliver their film to the Administration Building on the Fairgrounds by 10:30 p.m. that day.

A distinguished panel of judges will announce the awards on Children's Day, Tuesday, September 4, at 11:15 a.m. at Middle Land. The judges are Leonard R. Thurston, APRA, and president of the Photographic Guild of Detroit; Gilbert R. Lehmbeck, president of the Detroit Salon Society; and William J. Ober, of Windsor, Canada, associate of the Royal Photographic Society of England.
