FASHION DIRECTORS
ADVISE ON CARE
OF JEWELRY

More than 30,000 tons of unused costume jewelry are lying neglected in vaults, warehouses and jewelry boxes in homes throughout the country, according to a recent national survey conducted by Sarah Coventry Jewelry Fashion Show Directors.

It was found that there are two principal reasons for this astonishing accumulation of scrap metal: the jewelry is either out of style or it has become tarnished or broken.

A few basic rules have been compiled for the care of costume jewelry.

1. Wipe each piece of jewelry with a soft cloth before it is put away.
2. Place it in a dry, dust-free place.
3. Store each piece separately to avoid chipping. The best place is either in the original box in which it came or in a jewel box that has individual compartments.
4. Avoid washing jewelry. If possible, use only cold water. Hot water may loosen the cement. Never use soaps or detergents. These may leave a film or work their way into the settings. Detergents may seriously harm certain stones.
5. Close pins when putting them away. Do the same with bracelets and necklaces.

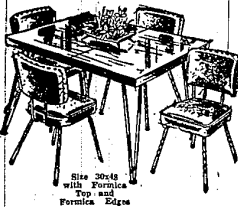

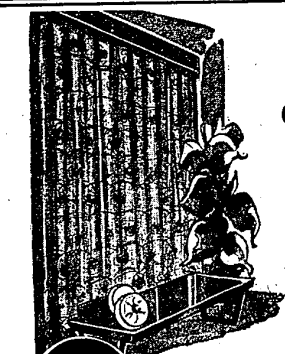
