BOOKLET ON AREA FOREST RESOURCES NOW AVAILABLE

The latest information on the forest resources of Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin has been compiled and is available to interested persons, according to the U. S. Forest Service.

Estimates of forest area, timber volume, growth, annual cut, area planted and other items of interest to timber growers and others have been published by the Lakes States forest experiment station at St. Paul, Minnesota.

According to the report, forests cover 53 million acres of land in the lakes states - 45 percent of the land area of these states. Timber volumes are building up because growth exceeds cut for nearly all species, but second growth stands frequently are inferior to the old growth in stocking and in quality of timber.

The report, entitled "Lake States Timber Resources," can be obtained from the Lakes States Forest Experiment Station, St. Paul Campus, University of Minnesota, St. Paul 1, Minnesota.

CHICKEN BACKS, WINGS, NECKS HAVE VARIETY OF USES

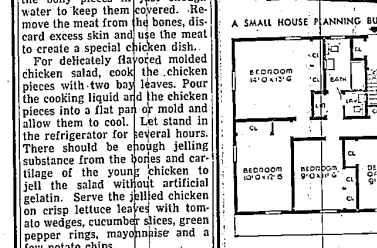
Don't be pessimistic over the bony chicken pieces left over from your chicken dinner. Just plan to use them in a number of dishes for some other family or company meal.

Better still, suggests Dr. Louise KERRY, food and nutrition professor at Michigan State University, when you clean a chicken, drain the backs, wings and necks and wrap them in moisture-proof paper to hold in the freshest compartment of the refrigerator or freezer for a while. Then the next time you serve a chicken dish, stew the bony pieces in just enough water to keep them covered. Remove the meat from the bones, discard excess skin and use the meat to create a special chicken dish.

For delicately flavored molded chicken salad, cook the chicken pieces with two bay leaves. Pour the cooking liquid and the chicken pieces into a flat pan or mold and allow them to cool. Let stand in the refrigerator for several hours. There should be enough jelling substance from the bones and cartilage of the young chicken to jell the salad without artificial gelatin. Serve the jelled chicken on crisp lettuce leaves with tomato wedges, cucumber slices, green pepper rings, mayonnaise and a few potato chips.

The bony pieces can also be used in chicken casseroles. Be sure to choose a recipe which will make use of the chicken stock for a part of the liquid in the casserole.

There are many other ways to use up bony pieces of chicken, urges Miss Kelley. Chicken pies, either family or individual size, can be a speciality. Chicken and dumplings should be given a try, or chicken croquettes can be used for a special meal. When you buy chicken, plan those bony pieces for tasty salads, sandwiches, casseroles, croquettes or pies.

Vision Has Marked Effect On Child's School Grades

Fifty per cent of all children who fail reading have an uncorrected vision problem, according to the Michigan Optometric Association which recommended better care for the 35 million pupils entering school in September.

The Association said the figure was based on a University of Chicago study of causes of reading failure.

As further evidence of the importance of vision to school achievement, it cited an Ohio State University study. There it was found that among children with "normal" vision, 73 per cent were scholastically satisfactory; 27 per cent were partial failures; and none were total failures.

Among children with vision problems, only 44 per cent were scholastically satisfactory; 19 per cent were partial failures; and 37 per cent failed in all subjects.

"With the aid of modern science, almost all children have their vision brought up to par," the association said. "The greatest need is for more diligence in discovering the cases that need care. Better vision screening methods are needed in the schools to supplement the superficial Snellen letter chart test."
