Mr. and Mrs. L. Tinson of Elm Grove spent three days in Uhrichsville, Ohio, last week at the home of friends.

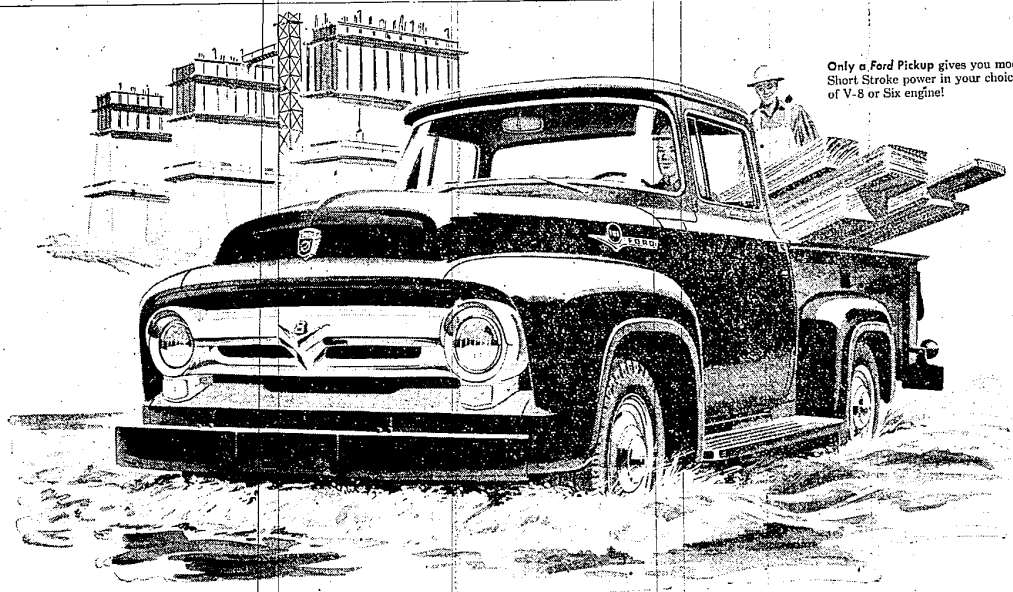

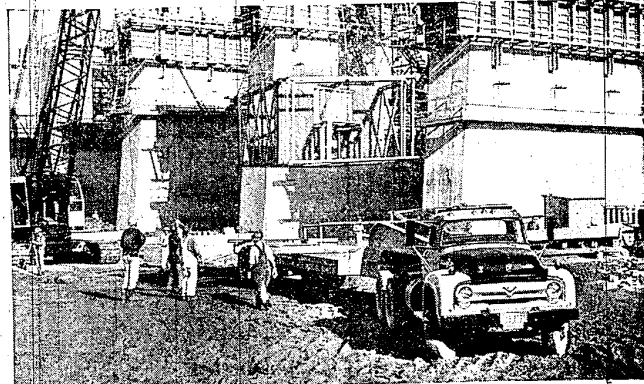
