TYPHOID FEVER CASES AT RECORD HIGH IN STATE

Typoid fever cases in Michigan are now greater in number than at any time in the last ten years, and the cause of the increase may be hidden in today's complex and widespread food distribution system.

Total number of cases in Michigan from January through August 1958 was 39, an increase of 24 over the same period in 1955 and highest since 1947.

Dr. George H. Agate, Michigan Department of Health epidemiologist, said the increase is still being studied and as yet no conclusive findings have been made.

"It is possible," Dr. Agate said, "that the source of infection lies outside a patient's home community or even outside Michigan. Our experience with an increased number of cases and our search for the cause is similar to what's been happening in several other Midwest states this year. The detection of contaminated food is very difficult because of the distance food now travels from point of manufacture to point of consumption. Thus, it is more important than ever to keep known typhoid carriers from handling or processing food," Dr. Agate said.

All cases of typhoid are traceable to persons who either have the disease or have had it and are still spreading the typhoid germ. The germ can be transmitted through water, milk or other food. There are about 200 known typhoid carriers in Michigan. All must register with the state health department. Local health officials then check, periodically, to see that the carriers practice good personal hygiene and do not work in food handlers.

About five out of over 100 persons who contract typhoid fever and recover continue to discharge typhoid germs in their wastes for the remainder of their lives. The germs often lodge in the carrier's gall bladder and removal of that organ by surgery usually converts him to a non-carrier.

Dr. Agate urged all persons who have had typhoid to submit voluntarily to frequent tests by their physicians to guarantee that they are not spreading the typhoid germ.

All typhoid cases in Michigan during 1958 have occurred in the Lower Peninsula. The cases have been distributed evenly throughout lower Michigan with no concentration by localities.

Expect Record State Grape Crop

The first of Michigan's grape crop, which promises to be nearly two and a half times larger than last year's first harvest and about one and a half times the average crops of the past five years, is beginning to reach local markets.

Early August estimates by the Federal State Crop Reporting Service placed Michigan's 1958 grape harvest at approximately 57,000 tons. Last year's harvest was drastically reduced by bad weather at the start of the growing season and amounted to only 23,500 tons. In fact the yield was so light that it was necessary to import grapes from other producing areas to supply Michigan's processing plants.

The first grape variety to be harvested in Michigan each year is the Champion jelly grape. As this variety is tart, it is more suitable for jelly making in the home than it is for eating out of hand.

Early sorts that follow the Champion jelly grape harvest are Cambell's Early, Worden's Early and the newer and more popular Fredonia. All are blue sorts.

In early September the harvest starts on Michigan's main variety. This is the time-honored Concord variety that received its name from historic Concord in Massachusetts. Concord production in Michigan is greater than production of all other varieties put together.

Leading the state in grape production is Van Buren County where the Grape Festival is held each year. Other prominent grape producing areas are Berrien and parts of Allegan, Kalamazoo and Cass Counties.

The greater part of Michigan's 57,000 tons of grapes this year will find their way into juice plants, jelly factories and wineries. Some Concord will be available in stores throughout the state late in September and early in October.

Housewives may identify the variety and grade of grapes they purchase by examining the container, which also must bear the name and address of the grower or packer.

State Fair Roundup

Variety Of Activities For Young And Old To Be Offered Aug. 31 - Sept. 9

The following round-up of exhibits, special events and entertainment at the 1958 Michigan State Fair in Detroit, August 31 through September 9, was released this week by Fair officials.

Grand Opening Day, Friday, August 31, will feature the opening parade in downtown Detroit at 11 a.m.

Saturday, September 1, is Veterans' Day. All veterans will be admitted free. Events scheduled for the day include a drum and bugle corps, rifle squad drill teams, memorial ceremonies and veterans' parade.

There will be a repeat of the popular Sunrise Service at 8 a.m. Sunday, September 2. Visitors attending the service, co-sponsored by the Detroit Council of Churches, will be admitted free to the Fairgrounds between 7 and 8 a.m. and may remain for the entire day. The Detroit Police Band will give a concert in the music shell prior to the service.

A more varied program has been arranged for Children's Day, Tuesday, September 4, and Old Times' Day, Thursday, September 6. There will be several contests for the youngsters: pie eating, watermelon eating, freckle-face, pony tail; and the oldest, too, will have their day of competition: the laziest man, longest married couple, oldest visitor to the Fair. Winners will receive cash awards and tickets to the Coliseum and Grandstand shows.

Saturday, September 6, will be Teachers' Day when the State Fair will honor Michigan teachers. All Michigan teachers will be admitted free.

Topnotch entertainers will be offered daily in the Coliseum. Three shows will be presented daily, at 3, 6, and 9 p.m. The first week end, August 31 through September 3, will headline Jay P. Morgan, Don Cherry and the Gaylords.

Following the livestock showing and judging on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday the Coliseum entertainment for the closing week end, September 7, 8, and 9, will feature Julius LaRosa, the McGuire Sisters and the Four Lads.

Featured on both week ends will be the Platters, the Blockbusters, the Krackerjacks, the Step Brothers, and Bud and Cecil Robinson.

The Farm Fun Frolics, presented free of charge, begin at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 4, 5 and 6. They will include Kitten Band music, million dollar livestock parade, presentation of awards, the Detroit Motor and Race Hall team, Arabian, Morgan, Western and Pleasure class horse demonstration.

At the Grandstand Buffalo Bill will star in a Texas rodeo, giving two performances daily August 31 through September 4 and again on September 8. On Wednesday, September 3, there will be a Marine Mock Attack and a Fire Fighting demonstration. On Thursday and Friday, September 6 and 7, the rodeo will give an evening performance only, with the 250 Mile time trials taking place

afternoons.

On Sunday, September 9, there will be a 10-mile Farmer Pick-Up Truck Derby at 1 p.m., the 250 Mile Stock Car Race at 2:30 p.m. and an Auto Thrill Show in the evening.

Meantime, a continuous program of free entertainment will be at the Music Shell and in the Old Times' Grove.

A major attraction in the Shell will be two concerts daily, with the exception of Wednesday evening, of the United States Air Force Band. There will be many other hand concerts, musical and amateur shows, nationality programs and dances, hobby classes and demonstrations, radio broad-

casts, and other featured. The Old Times Platform will have drum major and majorette contests, old time dancing, contests, and musical programs.

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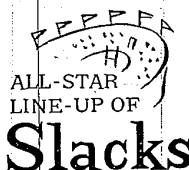
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
