the architect was instructed to proceed with final drawings.  
Board President Bayard Tupper informed the Board that he and Superintendent Dunckel have surveyed all possible suitable elementary school sites within the boundaries of the City. He stated that a site of approximately six acres adjacent to the US-16 Cut-Off between Manning and Maple might be obtained for \$25,000, and that a site of approximately six acres adjacent to the US-16 Cut-Off between Manning and Maple might be obtained for the east side of Gill Road near the Old Quaker Cemetery. Other Board members indicated that they will examine the two sites. A suitable site in the city is desired for the construction of a third elementary school of the \$2,000,000 bond issue approved by the Board of Education earlier this year.

Reports were made by school administrators on various improvement projects under way at school sites. It was revealed that painting at the Junior High School site, as well as grading and fencing of the parking lot, blacktopping of walks, and the installation of stair treads, had been completed. Blacktopping of the Eagle School parking lot is expected to be started this week. It was indicated that work on the parking lot at the high school has been hampered by bad weather, but that work should be nearly completed by the opening of school. According to Superintendent Dunckel, approximately 70 per cent of the work on the football field and running track at the high school site has been completed.

A request from the Oakland County Board of Education for the addition of two special education rooms at the new Junior High School site on Twelve Mile Road was granted by the Board. The rooms, to be used for the training of physically retarded children, will be constructed at the expense of the County Board of Education. In other action taken by the Board, additional appointments to the teaching staff were approved as recommended by Superintendent Dunckel. Also unanimously approved, upon the recommendation of Secretary Elizabeth Downing, was the rescinding of a previous motion calling for a review by administrators of all literary productions presented in school buildings prior to their public showings.

A request that a school bus be dispatched up Orchard Lake Road to 14 1/2 Mile Road to pick up Junior and Senior High School students was denied.

**Conservation Law Violation Fines 'Stiff'**  
Conservation law convictions reported last week resulted in an average penalty of more than \$22 for each of 54 violators. The group was ordered to pay \$806 in fines and \$421 in court costs in justice courts throughout the state. Several of the convictions were for possession of loaded firearms in automobiles or in game areas during closed seasons. Careless operation of motorboats brought penalties to two other persons.

**Editorial**  
**A New Kind Of Paralysis Has Struck Adult Population In Oakland County**

We never fail to marvel at the perversity of our fellow men. For years parents sought a polio vaccine and backed up their demands with generous contributions to the March of Dimes, officials of the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis stated.

Now we have the vaccine. When it was still in short supply the demand continued loud and clear, but now that there is plenty for the most susceptible group the demand has dwindled to a whisper. And this is not because the job has already been done. Far from it. Thousands of children in Oakland County remain unvaccinated. Some of them will be paralyzed by polio before the year is out. That is even sadder than usual because this is the first year that the paralysis of children side can be blamed on their parents' lack of foresight.

Why aren't parents having their children vaccinated?

1. Is it because they scorn what is easily obtainable? This may be understandable in the case of silk stockings, or the 1956, but can the health of our children be evaluated in this way?

2. Is it because parents feel "it can't happen here"? We are all inclined to react this way about anything dreadful, but unless we take individual steps to avoid the avoidable we are likely to be tragically surprised.

3. Is it because parents haven't heard that their children are eligible? This seems hardly possible.

4. Is it because parents can't afford the vaccine? This just won't stand up. There is free vaccine available for those who need it. Pride should be no bar when the future health of children is involved.

5. Is it simply that parents have not gotten around to having their children vaccinated? In many cases, probably. Wherever this is true all we can say is: How apathetic can a parent get?

"Elements of all these questions are unfortunately involved in analyzing the total picture. None is really valid. All that matters is that because of these and perhaps other reasons there will be children who are paralyzed by polio and their lives who needn't have been.

A hard and bitter price indeed for children to pay for our shortcomings.

Oakland County Board of Education will address the general session of teachers. He will speak on the subject of Special Education and working with boys and girls. The afternoon will be devoted to an informal conference with the various school principals. All elementary and junior - senior high school students of the Farmington District will begin classes on Thursday. Parents of kindergarten children and lower elementary students are being advised by letter as to which session classes will attend. All grades in the Clarenceville District will also open on Thursday, with the exception of kindergarten children who have already been enrolled. They will begin classes on Friday, September 7. Kindergarten students not previously enrolled will be registered on Thursday, September 6.

Registration of all new elementary and high school students in both Districts will continue through Friday, August 31.
