SCHOOL LUNCHES CAN BE NUTRITIOUS, GENEROUS, VARIED

If the school bell is your signal to start packing lunches five days a week, here is a guide for your bread of hungry school-age youngsters. Make it generous, make it well balanced, make it look good, and make it taste good.

To make it generous, the noon meal should include about one-third of your child's daily requirements.

In making it well balanced, use at least two ounces of protein food, such as meat, poultry, fish or cheese. Every day include fruit or a garden green vegetable. A yellow vegetable, such as carrots, should go in twice a week. Then top it off with milk and plenty of bread and butter.

To make it look good, use color in fruits, vegetables and the "little things" like napkins, salt and pepper and meat.

Don't forget it must taste good — include desserts such as cake, pie, jelly, jam, or other spreads.

Booklet On Nation's Tree Situation Available

The U. S. Forest Service has announced the publication of a new booklet which gives in "nontechnical terms" a picture of the nation's timber situation today, the probable demands on forests in the future, and the country's ability to meet these needs.

The booklet, "Timber and People," places particular emphasis on the part farmers and small woodland owners play in the nation's future timber supply.

The booklet may be obtained from the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D.C.

WORKING WIVES BOOST AVERAGE INCOME

The wife with a job is becoming an increasingly important factor in the American economy, it is reported in the September issue of "Business and Real Estate TRENDS," quarterly letter of the First Federal Savings of Detroit. The working wife has had a part in boosting the average family income 49 per cent since 1946, the letter asserts, adding that this income rise is "one of the most significant achievements of the American economy since World War II."

Almost one of every three married women last year had a job outside her home. The percentage of wives gainfully employed was 25.5 per cent. The increase has been steady since 1947 when it was 21.4 per cent. At the wartime peak in 1944 it was 25.6, which was considered phenomenal.

Average family income, according to Bureau of the Census figures cited by the quarterly letter, have risen from \$3,940 in 1946 to \$5,520 in 1955. Though much of the increase has been offset by higher prices, the net gain in goods and services is eight per cent.
