City Officials Will Attend Municipal League Meeting

Three members of City's administrative staff will attend the Annual Convention of the Michigan Municipal League to be held September 6 through September 8 in Grand Rapids.

Earl Scherffius, Farmington City Manager; Duane Parfain, Assistant City Manager; and Kathryn Cotter, City Clerk, will be among a group of Municipal Officers from 394 Michigan Cities and Villages who will take part in the Annual Meeting. The Convention will feature a series of programs and discussions on matters of vital importance to communities such as Farmington.

"The vital issue of providing water and sewerage facilities to those living beyond city and village limits will be thoroughly examined by a panel of experts. The topic is headed, "Water and Sewage Service"—State or Local Control."

"Another issue of major interest among municipalities now is, the fact that most of the cities are dealing with the disruption that follows a natural disaster. One general session will be devoted to a critique of recent disaster experience in Michigan and feature municipal officials who were on the scene. It will also take up a League-developed uniform disaster control ordinance."

To discuss the municipal income tax which is an issue of growing importance, the League will have a session on "Income Taxation" which now levy such a tax. League policy meetings will be held to consider other issues such as annexation, city representation on boards of supervisors, and the municipal highway policy for 1955-57.
