

Air Reservists Stand To Lose Commissions

Air reserve officers residing in the Farmington, Plymouth, Northville, Livonia, Redford, South Lyon and Wayne areas who have been inactive since the close of the Korean War will face loss of their commissions and standing in the military service unless they comply with minimum training requirement under the Reserve Officers Promotion Act.

"Nineteen thousand air reservists, many in the West Detroit area, already have been passed over," Captain Lawrence Ransom, commander of the Plymouth unit, said this week. "Officers in the seven commissions which this unit covers still have a chance to save their commissions if they again become active. Those who are passed over twice are automatically eliminated, and in event another war would have to start all over again."

Captain Ransom said all inactive reservists residing in the Plymouth unit will be contacted during September or October in an effort to arrange sufficient activity to obtain the required 35 points annually.

The Plymouth unit meets at the Veterans Memorial Hall in Plymouth at 7:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Tuesdays.

Intends to let the balance of the construction work to the same contractor as soon as he reports on the job. The underground drain will run in the easement between the Bel-Aire Subdivision and the rear of the homes facing on the north side of Shawnee, and will extend from Power to Prospect.

A large number of property owners in the Bel-Aire Subdivision appeared before the Council to request assistance in the elimination of drainage problems in the subdivision. The majority of the residents from Colchester and Lee Lane stated that their back yards and basements are being continually flooded as a result of improper drainage. Several property owners added that they have built retaining walls in order to protect their property.

The City Manager suggested that a list of all affected property owners be secured, through the help of the Bel-Aire Civic Association, and that the list would be referred to L. N. Hayden, engineer, for investigation and a report to the Council.

The Council approved an amendment to the Traffic Ordinance providing for two-hour parking on the south side of Grand River from School Street east to Mayfield. Signs designating the parking zone will be installed as soon as they are available.

A motion was made and approved that outside water users be charged the 25% water debt service fee and 50% interceptor debt service fee on their base bill prior to the addition of the double water rate. At the present time the 75% debt fee is being charged on the total double rate. Prior to the vote, Councilman Paul Calkins stated that he was opposed to charging any of the interceptor debt fee to the outside users since they would receive no benefit. Councilman V. O. Baker stated that he felt the debt service fee should remain the same. The roll call vote was three "yes" and two "no."

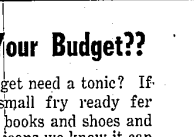
