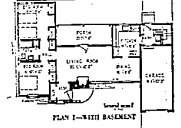
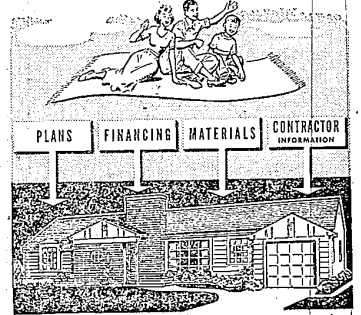

Boy Scouts Plan National 'Get Out The Vote' Drive

A major activity of the Boy Scouts of America this year will be a nationwide campaign to urge citizens to register and vote in the elections this fall.

Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout executive, said that a record membership of over 4,175,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers, and adult leaders will take part in the 1956 Get-Out-The-Vote campaign, jointly sponsored by the Boy Scouts of America and the Freedoms Foundation, Inc., of Valley Forge.

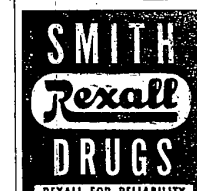
The campaign will be strictly nonpartisan in its concept and execution, the Chief Scout executive said.

In 1952 Scouts distributed more than one million posters and thirty million Liberty Bell doorknob hangers to the homes of America, which helped to bring a record turnout of 61,500,000 voters.

Since a principal reason for not voting is failure to register, the Boy Scouts' first activity will be to get potential voters to register. Attractive four-color posters, one and a quarter million of them, will encourage citizens to register and to vote. These posters bear the slogan, "Vote as you think, but vote November 6." Before registration deadlines the posters will be placed in stores, hotels, transportation terminals, soda fountains, doctors' offices, factories, newsstands, social clubs, utility offices, and other heavy traffic centers.

Then, just before November 6, the Scouts and leaders will call at 35,000,000 homes in America and place on doorknobs a hanger shaped like the Liberty Bell. The hangers bear the message, "Heed youth's call. Vote as you think, but vote November 6, 1956. Use your freedom to vote." Householders will be asked to display the hangers in their windows indicating their intention to vote.

Record United Foundation Torch Drive Goal Set At \$15,300,000

The Torch Drive is reaching for its first hundred million dollars. Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, president of the United Foundation, announced that the board of directors and advisory board at a meeting last week had set a goal of \$15,300,000 for the Eighth Annual Torch Drive, October 16 through November 8.

In the past seven years, \$87,000,000 has been raised in the campaign "give once for all" campaign to raise funds for support of 150 health and community services.

Action was taken by the board members after hearing the recommendations of Meyer L. Prentiss, chairman of the goal and allocations committee.

Prentiss' committee has been meeting throughout the summer to hear agency budget requests. Their recommended goal was established as a result of these hearings.

"We have set a goal which will meet the minimum requirements of the agencies," Prentiss said. "It is up to every contributor to realize this is a minimum figure and that each of the agencies is depending on the campaign to produce the goal."

Walter C. Laidlaw, United Foundation executive vice president, gave the following reasons for the increased goal:

1. The American Cancer Society, Southeastern Michigan Division, has extended its services in the Oakland County and Downriver areas.
2. The American Red Cross has transferred its blood program from a partial defense measure to a civilian operation, extended Home Service due to population growth, and had increased national demands because of the depletion of the disaster fund.
3. The cost of operating the Rehabilitation Institute has increased.
4. New agencies have been added.

Shoppers' Column

Vegetables, Fruit Still Plentiful

Homegrown supplies of fruits and vegetables continue to star on the September food list. With these, poultry, dairy products, and plenty of eggs complete the basic food pattern for good eating.

Just right for the lunch box or for snacks after school are crisp McIntosh apples, arriving from Michigan orchards.

Cantaloupes with vine-ripened flavor are more plentiful as more are harvested in the state. If cantaloupes are mature when picked, there will be a slightly sunken, calloused scar at the stem end. A light green background with a yellow or grayish cast under the netting, coarse netting, and a fragrant sweet aroma are reliable guides when choosing. Shaking a cantaloupe or pressing on the stem end damages the melon.

While most meats increase in price at this season, lamb prices are on a slight decline. Late August and early September mark the beginning of the normal heavy marketing season for native Michigan lambs.

The thrifty shopper will look for ways to fit lamb stew, riblets, shanks, shoulder and ground lamb or lamb patties into the menu. Boned shoulder and breast ground into patties and broiled are given extra special flavor when a slice of bacon is wrapped around each patty and secured with a toothpick.

The 1956 turkey supply is 10 million birds bigger than last year. Shoppers will find all sizes of turkey selling at near the same retail prices. The yield of meat in proportion to bone is greater from large turkeys. If the price is about the same for all the sizes, more meat for the money can be had by choosing the larger birds.

Although tomatoes are not in as heavy supply as they have been the last two weeks, they remain one of the favored vegetables for adding color and Vitamin C to the day's meal.

Potatoes are better quality than they were when so many immature ones came to market in August. Smart shoppers will always avoid potatoes with any green color. Green color caused by light or sun damage is toxic and usually goes deep into the potato.

Prices on small eggs coming to market offer an opportunity to use this protein food at a savings.

A group of 80 Boy Scouts from Boys Republic and Explorers from Post 111 recently returned from a two-week camping experience at the University of Michigan Fresh Air Camp at Paterson Lake.

While there they enjoyed swimming, boating, over-night camp-outs, cook-outs, fishing, and practice on the rifle and archery ranges. Training was given in swimming by Red Cross instructors, with several of the boys learning the fundamentals and five or six others passing their senior swimming course.

The troop will hold its first meeting of the fall season from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, September 18, at the American Legion Hall.

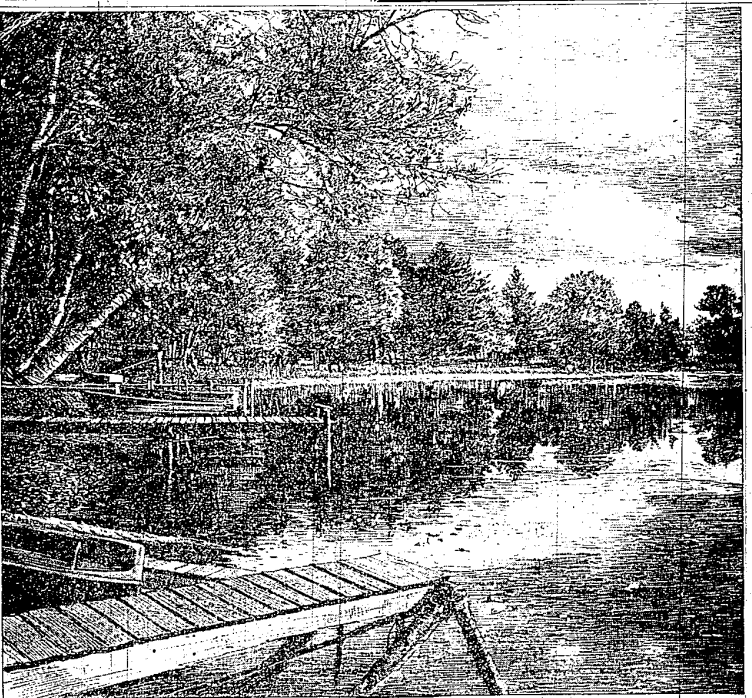

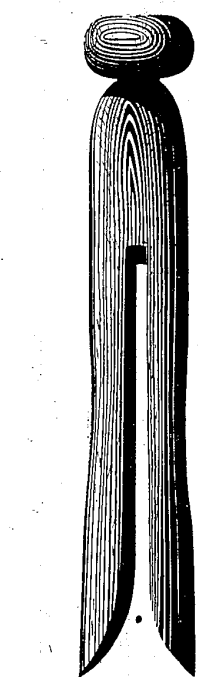
