Detroit Town Hall will go from the ornate to the modern when it transfers its operations next month from the Fisher Theater to Ford Auditorium on Woodward Avenue.

The auditorium, constructed in the shape of a huge radio speaker, is done in shades of chocolate and light brown. Turquoise seats are in sharp contrast to the subdued colors of the walls. They are on a gradual incline from the stage, enabling all persons to see perfectly.
