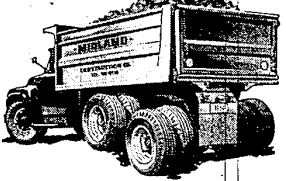
### Looking Ahead

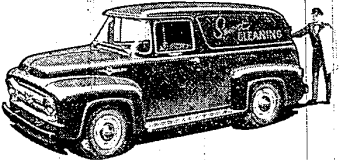

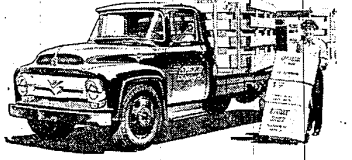

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### Dr. Bond Named West Economic Association Head

Dr. Floyd A. Bond, former Michigan educator and now a Pomona College professor at Claremont, California, has been elected president of the Western Economic Association for the coming year. A native of Farmington, Bond was graduated from Pontiac Senior High School in Pontiac in 1930 and received B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Michigan, graduating with distinction in college and "honors in economics." As an undergraduate at Michigan he held a Mandelbaum Scholarship and as a graduate student he was awarded a university scholarship. He was elected to Phi Beta Kappa at the U. of M.

He taught from 1938 until 1946 at the University of Michigan and for the next two years at Carleton College in Minnesota. He became a member of the Pomona College faculty in 1948. Bond was professor of economics and chairman of the Pomona department of economics.

The Western Economic Association includes professors of economics and business at colleges and universities in seven Western states, Hawaii and British Columbia. Dr. Bond was secretary-treasurer of the association in 1952 and vice-president in 1954.

He is author of the book, "Public Regulation in Action," published by the University of Michigan Press in 1948, and is director of the Pomona College Social Science Research Institute and author of the institute's book, "Our New Age." Bond is vice-chairman of the Southern California Council on Economic Education and has directed several summer workshops on economic education. He gained national prominence this summer as director of a two-week liberal arts program for younger business executives at Pomona College. This unusual program contrasted sharply with the well-known management training courses usually offered in summer sessions. Bond's work and the program were outlined in a TIME magazine article of July 30. Bond was editor of the economics section of the Annals of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts, and Letters in 1943-45.

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
