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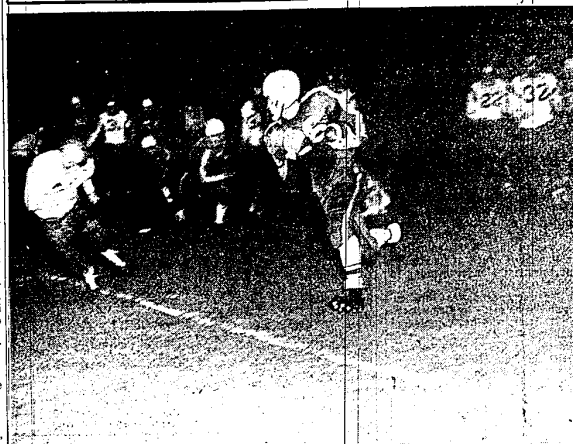

THE FALCONS of Farmington turned the tables on the Clarenceville Trojans last Friday night in their opening gridiron contest by handing them a 13-0 defeat. During the two previous years the Clarenceville grid teams, in an underdog roll, had downed the Falcons in their second community rivalry contest. Falcons' first TD was also scored by McLellan shortly after the opening of the second half. Fumbles proved costly to the Trojans. A fumble deep in their own territory gave the Falcons the ball in scoring position for their first touchdown and another cost the Trojans a TD for themselves. They bobbled the ball which Farmington recovered within ten yards of paydirt.

Farmington Downs Clarenceville, 13-0, In Season Opener For Two Schools

After a first half seasaw battle, with neither team scoring, the Farmington Falcons pushed over two touchdowns in the second half in their opening contest of the season against the Clarenceville Trojans last Friday night for a 13-0 victory.

The Falcons' first touchdown came early in the second half when they capitalized on a Trojan fumble deep in their own territory. Falcon kicker Ray Porter booted the piggskin into the enemy zone on the opening kickoff starting the second half and it was spotted out on the 20 yard line. On the second play from scrimmage the Trojans fumbled and an alert Falcon defenseman recovered the ball.

Taking the ball around the 20 yard marking, Falcon backs drove to the six yard line where McLellan, halfback, took the ball over. The try for the extra point was unsuccessful.

Farmington again kicked off to the Trojans who brought the ball back up field to the 25. On a sustained march back down the field, the Trojans plunged with the ball to the 7 yard stripe on five consecutive first downs. At this point, however, the Falcon defensive bore down. On the first down they held the Trojans for no gain and on the next two plays from scrimmage pushed them back for eight and six yard losses. On the fourth down a Trojan pass was intercepted in the end zone by Farmington's Dave Catberman.

The second Falcon touchdown of the game came on a long march from the Trojan 20 to pay dirt. The drive was highlighted by a long run by halfback Mike Agee. McLellan again plunged over for his second touchdown of the evening. The extra point boot by Ray Porter was good.

In the closing minutes of the game the Trojans again staged a strong downfield drive sparked by fullback Dale Devitt only to lose the ball again on a fumble inside the Falcon 10 yard marker. Larry Staupp for the Falcons made the recovery.

Duck Hunting Test Slated In Minnesota

Waterfowl specialists in several states in the Mississippi flyway will have a special interest in Minnesota's duck hunting this fall. An experimental season will be tried this year in Minnesota which will give that state an extra duck in the bag limit of five ducks per season than the other 13 states in the flyway.

The experimental season will begin October 8 and continue for 28 days, ending November 29. Shooting days were cut off at both the beginning and end of the regular season. This in effect permitted Minnesota to exchange 15 shooting days and a later opening date for a bag limit of five ducks per day.

The experiment is an attempt to re-establish nesting populations in prairie areas of Minnesota. The Federal Fish and Wildlife Service said studies will be made to determine the effect of the shorter season and increased bag limit.

Game specialists from Michigan and other Mississippi flyway states will examine the results of these studies.

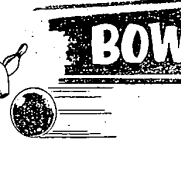
