In a letter to the Board, Eagle added that: "At the time, in April, when I was appointed as Supervisor, following the death of Mr. Blanchard, I made it very clear to the Board that I reserved the Tight to consider it only as an emergency or temporary appointment. "An emergency did exist at that time as there were several matters which had been held in abeyance during the illness of Mr. Blanchard that required immedi-ate attention.

Floods Basements The near record rain and elect-rical storm which hit the Farming-ton area Saturday and Sunday re-sulted in considerable damage from flooded basements and dis-rupted public utilities. According to the weather bu-rear, a total of four whether bu-ticaviest water damage in the city was reported in the Bel-Aire Sub-division, parts of the Alta Loma Subdivision, as well as Oakland, State and Shiawassee Streets. The new West Brothers Beauty Shop on Grand River, in the center of the business district, was also flooded during the storm. Dam ge was widespread in the Town-ship with the bulk of the com-plaints coming from the southeast-ern section. ern section.
