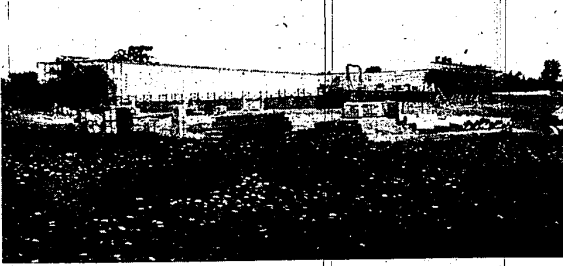

### RIPENING TOMATOES

Vine ripened tomatoes have better flavor than those picked green, but these are not always found in the markets as they bruise easily in handling and shipment. If under-ripe tomatoes are bought, spread them in a dry place, light air, and Mrs. Gilbert Treweek, to 70 degrees to ripen. In summer, most basements are the ideal temperature for ripening tomatoes. Putting under-ripe tomatoes in the refrigerator stops ripening and makes them watery.
