 ing major religious groups, and members selected from minority racial groups, will be reactivated by Governor Williams as a "watchdog" over the 1956 campaign.

Wholeheartedly endorsed by Republican Chairman John Felken and Democratic Chairman Nell Steehler, the committee relies entirely on its ability to rally public opinion in curbing anonymous attacks, and racial and religious bigotry.

First initiated four years ago, the committee served in the last two elections with good results, says Boris M. Joffe, secretary of the board. All results in investigations are made public in reports throwing the spotlight on offenders.

FLUORIDATION OF WATER to prevent tooth decay received a big boost when the U. S. Public Health Service reported favorably on a 10 year study in Grand Rapids.

The scientific evidence is conclusive, the report says, "that water fluoridation is an effective public procedure for producing a substantial reduction in the incidence of dental cavities."

Results in the study, which began in 1945, show a reduction of 64 per cent in cavities in the baby or first teeth; a reduced cavity rate of about 60 per cent among children born since the experiment began; and no undesirable coloring of the teeth because of contact with the fluoride.

The survey did not as yet ascertain the effects on the teeth of adults. In the past it was commonly thought that fluoridation does nothing to help adult teeth, but the report states that preliminary findings indicate that some beneficial effect may be gained by older age groups.

The American Dental Association endorses the fluoridation of water, which is still a controversial issue in many communities.

Gerald Keck Completes Training At Great Lakes

SEVEN WONDERS OF WORLD TO OPEN IN DETROIT AUG. 14

The third Cinerama production, Lowell Thomas' "Seven Wonders of the World" will present its Midwest premiere at the Music Hall on Tuesday, August 14.

According to Lowell Thomas, who led a corps of seven directors in all parts of the world, it should be the most ambitious of the Cinerama productions yet made.

Two productions in one were organized. Paul Mantz, the stunt pilot and daredevil who photographed the "America the Beautiful" climax of "This Is Cinerama," flew around the world to film the aerial sequences.

The flying film studio was fitted out for the second group. The plane, a chartered Pan American Airways DC-4, christened the "Cinerama Clipper," headed around the globe with directors and camera crews to record the wonders close-up.

All in all, Thomas, Mantz, directors and camera crews visited 40 countries. The production captured the grandeur of the Marian Year celebration in Rome, dance sequences involving the tallest natives in Africa, a runaway train in India, and the fragile beauty of Japanese girls and scenery.

Lowell Thomas describes "Seven Wonders of the World" as a "modern Odyssey in search of the wonders of our world."

He acts as both a narrator and guide, with the audience orienting in the adventure. He does everything but determine which will be the audience's own seven wonders. He explains that in the third Cinerama presentation, the choice is a personal one of the mind and heart.
