SPARE TIRE SERVES AS LIFE PRESERVER IN EMERGENCIES

According to safety experts for a leading national insurance company, the spare auto wheel and tire, fully inflated, can be used effectively as a life preserver.

The tire can be used as a life raft for several persons from an upset boat, for tests show it will actually support three or four persons. It can be quickly rolled and pushed out to reach a swimmer in trouble.

A person untrained in rescue methods can grasp a drowning person by holding the wheel firmly and propelling it by kicking with legs and feet until the victim is reached. It is essential that the rescuer keep calm and keep the wheel between himself and the persons he is helping.

If the rescued person can not assist in the return trip to shore, both persons should remain quiet, support themselves on the tire, and wait until help arrives.

The safety specialists urge that waterside vacationers be sure that the spare tire is kept inflated to proper level, lug loosened and ready to be removed from the car, and kept near the water if possible.

It makes good life-saving sense to have this emergency rescue aid always handy. A few precautions should be noted, however: Never use the device as a floating toy, it is heavy and rough and may cause injury, the professor says.

If you can't swim, it's safer to move the tire to the drowning person by a stick, pole, or car. Never throw the tire to or at him. He might be hit by the heavy object or it might land out of his reach.

Never consider this device as a substitute for knowing how to swim or knowing water rescue work. Surest way to avoid drowning is to have every member of the family be a competent swimmer and Red Cross trained in life saving.

Caution Urged In Care Of Poison

Accidental poisoning, especially among children, takes a heavy toll of life every year, health authorities point out. Most of it is due to carelessness.

The following precautions are suggested by Dr. Joseph G. Molnar, Detroit, Commissioner of Health, to prevent accidental poisonings.

1. Be sure all poisons are clearly marked. This can be done by using adhesive tape or using a special marker.
2. Labels can be prevented from coming off containers by covering with transparent tape.
3. Do not take medicine, from an unlabeled bottle.
4. Look up all dangerous substances including insecticides, bleaches, cleaning fluids, turpentine, non-self poisoning liquid wax, kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid, and weed killers.
5. Use cleaning fluids with adequate ventilation only, and avoid breathing vapors.
6. Protect your skin and eyes when using insect poisons, weed killers, solvents, and cleaning agents. Be sure to wash thoroughly after use of such things, and promptly remove contaminated clothing.
7. Do not allow food or food utensils to become contaminated when using insect sprays, aerosol mists, rat poisons, weed killers or cleaning agents.
8. Do not throw out drugs or hazardous material but empty the container and dispose of the contents so that it cannot be found by children or pets.
9. Warn small children not to eat or drink drugs, chemicals, plants, or berries they find without permission. Insist on this.
10. Particularly, safeguard tablets which are candied, flavored, or colored, since children eat them like candy.

HAY FEVER SEASON WILL BEGIN SOON, SAY HEALTH OFFICIALS

It isn't a fever and it isn't caused by hay, but by any other name it would be a miserable one. Hay fever, according to the Michigan Department of Health, is a general term which includes all kinds of allergies to various pollens, dusts, and other offenders.

Some people, the health department explains, suffer from perennial hay fever which may occur at any time of the year. It is caused by sensitivity to house dusts, animal hair, feathers or other substances. Then there is seasonal hay fever which is caused by pollen from grasses such as timothy and redtop. Spring hay fever is a result of tree pollens.

Most common, however, is seasonal hay fever usually due to ragweed pollen. Ragweed is one of the most common Michigan weeds, growing wild in fields, vacant lots, and along highways.

Hay fever in large quantities by mid-August and may travel great distances over land and water, carried by the wind. It is not, as many people believe, hay fever, according to the health department, is retreat. Fortunately, Michigan offers areas sufficiently free from ragweed pollen to be comfortable for the average hay fever sufferer. These include most of the upper peninsula and the northern third of the lower peninsula.

For those unable to get away during the hay fever season, the family doctor may suggest injections to reduce sensitivity to the allergens. These are called desensitization treatments. There is also the possibility of removing pollen through the use of an air filter or a dehumidifier.

If none of these is successful, the only thing to do is suffer through the season. Although it is most uncomfortable, hay fever is one malady with a sure cure, for winter always comes.

MORE WILD TURKEYS TO BE RELEASED IN STATE SOON

Conservation Department game biologists are studying possible release of the northern wild turkey for wild turkey plantings scheduled to take place the latter part of this month.

The plantings are part of an experimental program to restore the big birds to Michigan. Other releases under this program were held in Allegan state forest in 1952, and in Lake and Newagaw Counties last year.

The turkeys were hatched from 400 eggs obtained from Pennsylvania. The young turkeys were placed in the wild when they are about 14 weeks old.

Because of the need for wild turkey in the northern part of the state, the most suitable release sites are located in the western portion of the lower peninsula.

Evaluation studies made earlier this year on previous releases indicate the wild turkeys are doing reasonably well in Allegan and Newagaw Counties. Success in Lake County has been somewhat lower.

Game men hope the turkeys will be re-released in the latter part of their former Michigan range. The big birds, once abundant in the state, were a top target for hunters, but disappeared about 50 years ago.

SHOOTING STARS TO FILL AUGUST SKY, ASTRONOMER SAYS

"Shooting stars" will flash across the August skies at a higher rate than at any other time of the year, according to University of Michigan astronomer, Hazel M. Losh.

This is the yearly shower of the Perseid Meteoric Shower, which will last for two or three weeks. Although these streaks of light may be seen in any direction, their paths, when traced, will appear to intersect in the northeast where the constellation, Perseus, will be rising around 10 p.m. This accounts for the name given to the annual display of light.

These bits of iron and stone become visible only when they enter the Earth's atmosphere. "Coming in at terrific speeds," Professor Losh continues, "they are checked and the resulting friction sets them burning." However, most of them are consumed in their brief flight.

Among the bright planets of interest this month will be Saturn in the southwestern sky. "It will set around midnight."

Mars, red in color, will be rising around 10 p.m. just slightly south of the most eastern point of the horizon. "This is the year of the close approach of Mars to the Earth," the professor explains.

Although it will remain its closest distance in September, during the month of August it will be rapidly coming nearer, changing its distance from 43 million miles at the beginning of the month to a little more than 35 million by the end.

An Ordinance for the Licensing and Registration of Plumbers and for the Adoption of Rules and Regulations for the Regulation, Installation, Alteration and Maintenance of Plumbing in the City of Farmington

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

1. That the under authority and power granted by the provisions of Act 279 Public Acts of Michigan of 1909, as amended and Section 7.7 of the Charter of the City of Farmington, the City of Farmington does hereby adopt certain State Statutes and State Rules and Regulations, as hereinafter set forth pertaining to the licensing and registration of plumbers and the rules and regulations regarding construction, installation, alteration and maintenance of plumbing, all of which shall apply to the City of Farmington.

2. The City of Farmington does hereby adopt and enact as a part of this ordinance the provision of Act 226 of the 1929 Public Acts of Michigan, as now or hereafter amended.

3. The City of Farmington does hereby adopt and enact as a part of this ordinance the provision of Act 226 of the 1929 Public Acts of Michigan as now or hereafter amended.

4. The City of Farmington does hereby adopt and enact as a part of this ordinance all existing rules and regulations of the state plumbing board and all future amendments and/or additions thereto as a part of this ordinance.

This ordinance was introduced and adopted at a regular meeting of the council of the City of Farmington, on August 6, 1958, and will take immediate effect upon publication.

Copies of the State Laws adopted by reference in the above ordinance are on file in the office of the City Clerk for inspection. Copies of rules and regulations referred to are available for inspection and for distribution. A reasonable charge will be made for distribution, which charge will be fixed by the council of the City.

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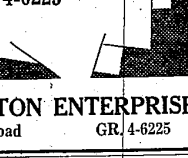
