FISHING WITHOUT LICENSE COSTLY, REPORT REVEALS

Fishing without a license continues to be one of the most frequent conservation law violations in Michigan.

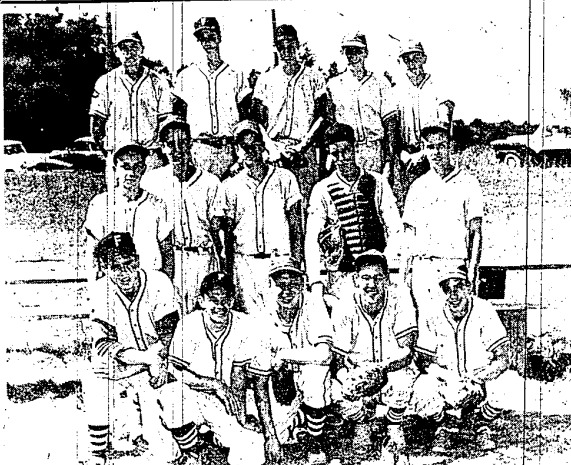
Of the 112 conservation law convictions reported last week, 74 persons received financial penalties for failure to purchase a state fishing license.

The 112 violators paid a total of \$882 in fines and \$973 in court costs. Money from fines goes to library funds in the county where the fine is collected.

Resident fishing licenses cost \$1.50; temporary nonresident permits cost \$3; and annual nonresident licenses are \$4. A trout stamp costs an additional \$1.

A fishing license is required for all persons 17 years of age or older, except wives of resident fishermen, for fishing on inland waters in Michigan. No license is required for sport fishing on the Great Lakes, Lake St. Clair, or the Detroit, St. Clair and St. Mary's Rivers.

PROFESSOR OFFERS TIPS ON CLEANING, PREPARING FISH

A few tips for fishermen were offered recently by Prof. Karl F. Lagler, chairman of the Department of Fisheries in the School of Natural Resources, University of Michigan.

He suggests stripping the skin off the fish with pliers to do away with the mess of flying fish-scales. He points out that every fisherman should be equipped with pliers in case someone sits or stands on a fishhook.

After the skin is off, slit the underside from gills to vent to get out the entrails, flipping the dark red kidneys out of the top of the body cavity with the thumb, then rub the cavity with salt to clean it, he says.

Leave the fins in, they'll come out more easily after the fish is cooked, the professor says.

And as for the cooking, a freshly caught fish fried in smoking fat in a kettle or frying pan over an open fire is a real treat, he claims.

Overnight campers who have had some luck with the trout may want to try baking it, he mentions. To do this roll the cleaned and seasoned fish in waxed paper and fold the ends. Cover this with several thicknesses of wet newspaper and put each separately wrapped fish in a small hole, covered with dirt and build a campfire on top of it. Don't remove or unwrap the fish until breakfast is served the next day, he cautions.

Fish can be pan broiled, and it's best to use very little fat in the pan. For fish other than whitefish and trout, which are quite fatty, a good sauce for baking is made by mixing a tablespoon of lemon juice with half a cup of cream.

To bring out the flavor of smelt try using some milk, the professor suggests. Soak the fish in milk for half an hour before frying; then dip the smelt in a batter made of two eggs, three table spoons of cream and some sifted bread crumbs, and fry in deep fat.

For charcoal-broil enthusiasts, try wrapping the fish with bacon and broiling over hickory charcoal.

CONSERVATION GAME HABITAT PROGRAM EXPANDED

Game habitat development on Michigan farms continued to progress during the first half of the year as Conservation Department workers completed and processed wildlife development plans for 235 farms.

More than 1,025,000 seedlings were supplied for spring planting to some 922 farmers who are cooperating in the program. Of this group, 402 were new to the program and 520 were continuing cooperators.

The Department also provided wire, posts, and seed of grass, legumes and buckwheat to aid farmers in developing suitable game habitat on their land.
