ceed with working drawings on both buildings.

The plan for the Kendallwood site calls for 12 regular classrooms, a kindergarten room and a multi-purpose room. The Westland Grace plan specifies ten classrooms, a kindergarten room and a multi-purpose room.

During a discussion on new school sites, it was recommended by President Bayard Tupper that negotiations be renewed for a site in the vicinity of Middlebelt and Twelve Mile Roads. It was also requested that an option be obtained on a parcel of property offered to the Board earlier for a site south of Twelve Mile and west of Farmington Road. Negotiations are being continued for an elementary site in the City, it was indicated at the meeting.

A request for use of the Junior High School gymnasium by the Kiwanis Club for presentation of the Kiwanis World Travel Series lectures was granted. An additional request for the waiving of service charges on the gym for the six lectures, however, was not granted.

It was reported at the meeting that a further study is being made to determine whether or not a walk easement from Bel-Aire Subdivision to the Senior High School property should be opened as indicated by some residents' desires. The property line between Bel-Aire and the school property is presently completely fenced off.

In other action taken by the Board, the resignation of two teachers was accepted and approval given for the appointment of several others. Superintendent Dunkel indicated that only eight or nine teachers remain to be hired for the coming school year.

A petition that a small parcel of land in Farmington Township but in the Novi School District be taken into the Farmington District was unanimously approved. The parcel will now be forwarded to the Novi Board and the Oakland County Board for their approval or disapproval.

Painful injuries were suffered this week by Mrs. Florence Meyers of 21214 Middlebelt Road when she fell down the basement steps in her home and broke her ankle in three places. She was taken to Harper Hospital in Detroit for treatment.

New Home Building In Township Doubles High Set In 1st Half Of '55

Residential building starts in Farmington Township for the first six months of this year almost doubled those for the same period in 1955, a report from the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission disclosed this week.

There were 385 residential building permits issued in Farmington Township during the first half of this year as compared with 200 issued during the first six months of 1955.

This record building activity in the Township is in sharp contrast to residential building throughout the remainder of Oakland County and the Detroit Metropolitan Region. A decline in home building for the first half of this year as compared with the same period last year was reported not only in Oakland but also in Wayne and Macomb Counties. There were 17,932 building permits issued in the three-county area from January through June, of this year. This is 2,500 less residential building permits than were issued in the three counties during the first half of 1955.

The decline in the Detroit Region is in line with national residential building declines, the Planning Commission pointed out, reflecting a readjustment in dwelling units from the peak year of 1955. Increased construction costs and costs of building services facilities for the new communities have been cited as the chief reasons for the national decline. Inadequate sewer and drainage systems in many suburban and Macomb County communities, resulting in curtailments on building, were given as a primary reason for declines in those two counties.

Among the communities in Oakland County where building activities were reported heaviest, Farmington Township ranked fifth. Bloomfield Township issued the greatest number of building permits for the first half of 1956, 495; followed by Royal Oak City, 483; Farmington Township, 454; and Southfield Township, 449.

the storm. City crews were required to mark Power Road south of Shiawassee because of severe damage along the shoulder of the road.

ty Company on the Kendallwood sewage disposal plant. Following discussion the Board approved the appointment of a man selected by Brown to permanently supervise the operations of the disposal plant. They rejected, however, another request by Brown that the Township withhold the cost of installing washroom and toilet facilities at the site. It was the Board's contention that it was Thompson-Brown's responsibility to meet the State Board of Health requirements at the plant before the Township took over its operation.

an appeal from Frank Gust of Tulane Street that Purdue Street in Kensington Park Subdivision be opened up to Shiawassee Road was turned over to the road committee for study and recommendations. Gust indicated that only minor work would be required to open the street making a more direct route for youngsters going to the Shiawassee Elementary School.

The Board decided, following discussion, that appointment of a new Township Health Officer should be made as soon as possible. They agreed, however, that he should be permitted to appoint deputies from the Township Building Department to make inspections and answer complaints. This would relieve the Health Officer of most of the time-consuming work connected with the office.

A vote by the Board on whether or not to stop future building in Old Colony Subdivision due to alleged unsatisfactory water and sewage facilities was taken. The motion to stop building was defeated four to two, with Floyd Cairns and Elise Avery voting in favor of the motion. Other members of the Board indicated that they preferred to leave the entire matter in the hands of the County Department of Health.

Trustee Robert Harris reported to the Board that the existing well on Rhonswood Street was capable of pumping seven gallons a minute and that tests of the water are now being made. He requested that a legal opinion be obtained by Archie Leonard, attorney, on easements and ownership of the property.

In other action taken by the Board, a request by the County Social Security office that a representative be permitted to use the Clarenceville Fire Hall twice monthly was granted. Also approved was the payment of Social Security fees for Township employees retroactive to April 1, as requested, with the stipulation that employees repay the amount advanced by the Township over an extended period.
