

STATE TO RECEIVE
MORE SCHOOL LUNCH
PROGRAM MONEY

The Michigan school lunch program received a \$600,000 increase when the U. S. Department of Agriculture notified school officials of one-fourth more federal money available next year.

The total amount allocated to the states out of the new appropriation of \$100 million for the coming year is \$38.6 million. Last year the states received slightly more than \$87 million out of an appropriation of just over \$93 million. The remainder, more than \$16 million, is used by the U. S. D. A. to buy vitamin-rich foods which are available at "bargain" prices, and to pay administrative costs.

The money is allocated to the states on the basis of the number of children of school age and the need. States where the income per person is below the national average get slightly more money per child. Payments by the children and by state and local governments must total the federal contributions at least 3 to 1.

More than 11 million school children took part in the program last year and were served approximately 1,800 million meals.
