## New Educational Unit Of Church To Be Dedicated

The new educational unit of the Southfield Community Church will be dedicated in ceremonies on Sunday afternoon, November 4, at 3 p.m., according to the pastor, Reverend Raymond B. Bane.

Dr. Bartlett Hess, pastor of the Ward Memorial Church, Detroit, will speak and the youth choir of the church will sing. Following the dedication ceremonies, there will be an open house for inspection of the new facilities. The church is located at 21122 Indian Street, two blocks north of Eight Mile and four blocks east of Inkster Road.

The architect for the building is Lee Butler, designer of numerous churches in the Detroit area. The general contractor is the T&L Erecton Company, of which Mr. Frank Townsley is the president. Mr. Townsley and his son, Robert, who supervised the construction, attended the church.

The building just completed is the first of three construction stages planned for the immediate future, and will cost approximately \$150,000.

It houses three departments caring for over 400 people and providing 31 separate classrooms. Of contemporary design, the building, when completed, will be a new front to the entire project.

During the past nine years, the Bible school has grown from an average attendance of 135 to an attendance of 500. In addition, four youth clubs meeting weekly keep the facilities in constant use. The church has been using the facilities of the John Grace School next door, but now will be able to house its activities in its own building.
