

State Wood Sales Yield Record Return

State forests returned a record high of \$672,000 to the people of Michigan through the sale of wood products during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1956. Conservation Department figures indicated that the state forest yield was \$81,000 more than the previous record, set in the 1954-55 fiscal year. Money from the sale of wood products from state forests is used for reforestation.

The latest increase is a step in Michigan's move to regain the important timber position it occupied in the latter part of the 19th century.

Sales from state forests totaled only \$7,000 in 1941, but a general

upward trend has been experienced since that time.

Credit for the re-birth of state forests goes primarily to a shift in demand for various species. Aspen and other so-called "inferior" species have become extremely important in pulp manufacture, it was pointed out. Changes in market conditions also have boosted Michigan's timber position.

Sales of sawlogs, posts and ties and chemical wood also contribute revenue to the state each year.


