7:30 - 8:15 - First closed session.  
8:20 - 9:05 - Second closed session.  
9:05 - Browning period.

The Browning period from 6:30 - 7:30 p.m. is provided to give students a chance to visit with representatives from several of the 23 colleges, specialized schools and selective service represented.

The two closed sessions allow time for the representatives to speak on behalf of the institutions they represent. Usually there is time for questions and answers allotted during these periods.

In the event any questions are unanswered at the close of the closed sessions, another Browning period has been provided from 9:05 on.

It should be stressed that parents as well as students are welcome to attend.

The 23 institutions to be represented are: Adrian College, Albion College, Alma College, Business Institute, Central Michigan College, Cleary Business College, Detroit and Tri-County Council for Nursing, University of Detroit, Ferris Institute, General Motors Institute, Highland Park Junior College, Hillsdale College, Kalamazoo College, Lawrence Institute of Technology, Michigan State University, Eastern Michigan College, University of Michigan, Olivet College, Selective Service, Stephens College, Wayne State University, and Western Michigan College.

The College Night program serves upperclassmen of five other schools in addition to Farmington High. They are: Walley Lake, Northville, West Bloomfield, Milford and Waterford.

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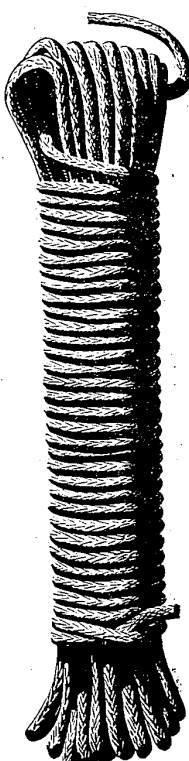
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
