The mishap left his wife, Mary Ellen, with the serious problem of caring alone for their two small children of preschool age in the new family home at 3169 Lee Lane. It also left her with the problem of high and continued medical bills for an extended period of time during her husband's long battle back to normal living. Mr. Chabala is still confined to the Dearborn Veterans' Hospital, where he was transferred following a short stay at Mt. Carmel Hospital immediately after the accident.

The dance to be given this Saturday night by the Redford Knights of Columbus at the Council Hall at 25300 Fenkell Avenue is another of these worthwhile fund raising efforts for the young Farmington family.

wood Subdivision appeared before the Board questioning the closeness of the proposed Kendallwood elementary school to property in the subdivision. It was pointed out in discussion that only one unit of the school would be really near the subdivision property line on the east. It was further pointed out that because of drainage problems, the building could not be moved to the north. Moving to the west would only bring the buildings exceedingly close to other property on that side of the building.

Concern was also expressed over the removal of trees from the site. The board gave assurance that efforts would be made to leave as many trees as possible standing and maintain a green belt between the school and private property to the east.

In discussion of this site, Meyers reported that the State had indicated 2 1/2-inches with the Kendallwood sewer system would be permitted provided that only children from Kendallwood and Westbrook Manor Subdivisions were to be enrolled there.

He indicated further that it was being planned to use the Kendallwood water system for the school. Residents raised the question of whether or not this would be possible. They stated that the present system was already being taxed to capacity. A check will be made by the architect to determine the advisability of using Kendallwood water in view of the alleged inadequacies of this source.

Board President Bayard Tupper reported that efforts to obtain a third elementary school site in the City south of Warner Farms Subdivision were still being made. He indicated, however, that they had been greatly hampered by recent action of the City rejecting a proposal for rezoning of property adjacent to the school site as commercial. This is a parcel of land at the northeast corner of Farmington Road and the U.S. 16 Cut Off.

statutes make no provision for the issue of sales tax funds to liquidate bonds. However, a portion of this expense could be taken from the present \$14,000 balance held by the receiver.

In answer to a letter from the Forest Hills Subdivision, the Board authorized an investigation of conditions on property owned by Mrs. Olga Rice. Gain was directed to check the situation to see if a nuisance exists and to take whatever action is necessary to correct the situation. According to the letter, the property is in unsatisfactory condition and that old cars are being stored on the property. The Board also authorized the forwarding of a letter by registered mail to the Michigan State Commission requesting that the SDD license issued to Farmington Hills Market be revoked. The Board rejected the application at its last regular meeting on the grounds that such a license should not be issued to a grocery store. However, since the application was not acted upon within 30 days from date of issuance the license was automatically granted. According to township officials, the application was not received until well past the 30 day limit. A copy of the letter to be forwarded to the Attorney General's office.

The Board approved a motion to proceed with the installation of a pump for use on public well on Rhinowood. A line is to be connected to the pump and run to a hydrant at the street. The pump will be available for use by residents in the "dry area."

Authorization was granted to Canvasser Brothers for the removal of sand from property located on Thimble Road between Drake and Halsted Roads. It is proposed that a maximum of 200,000 yards of sand be removed from the property in preparation for the development of homesites. It was explained that the sand is being removed to improve drainage of the property and to make it suitable for development. Canvasser Brothers agreed to comply with any regulations which the Township might impose.

A request for the rezoning of Lots 1, 2, 3, 4 of Tarabish Roadland Gardens from Residential to Commercial was presented to the Board and referred to the Planning Board. The lots are located on Farmington Road in the vicinity of Flanders Street.

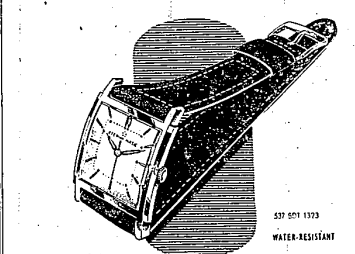
