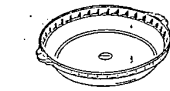

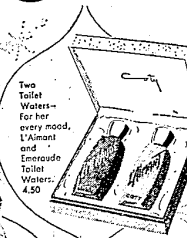

Indonesian Exchange Student Compares Homeland With U.S.A.

Ceylon, Aden, the Suez Canal, Port Said, Napoli, Sicily, Gibraltar, Lisbon, Halifax, New York, Detroit. That itinerary, followed by boat, with the exception of the New York to Detroit hop which was by plane, brought petite, 17-year-old Ann Noor to her adopted American home.

Ann, whose full name is Anizur, is the American Field Service exchange student at Farmington High this year.

Although she is only child at home, which is Djekarata, Java, the capital of Indonesia, Ann has acquired two American brothers, Robbie and Harvey, and an American sister, Pamela, American parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey E. Chapman, and a grandmother, Mrs. Mercer, all of whom she speaks of with a great deal of affection.

Her American home at 33624 Hillcrest in Farmington is not too different architecturally from her Indonesian home, she states. A roof and tile floors there would probably be the most outstanding differences.

The life of an Indonesian teenager is quite different from teenagers here, but their likes and dislikes are surprisingly similar, she commented.

Dating life is governed by religion and family. Those of the Moslem religion do not allow dating. On the other hand, dating is found among the liberal Moslems, Christians, Buddhists and others, she added.

Since Ann's family is Moslem and also one of the "better families," Ann does not date. That does not mean, however, that she doesn't have contact with people of her own age. Parties are common.

Parties for the younger people are usually in the afternoon and a crowd of 160 is not too uncommon, Ann said.

Marriage, too, is involved with religion and is part of the old fashioned versus modern battle. Although Indonesians substitute soccer for football and judo for wrestling, they participate in or follow baseball, basketball, volleyball, etc., just as we do.

"American music is the most popular," Ann says.

Dances include the waltz, tango, rumba, mambo and boogie woogie. Many Indonesian teenagers take private dancing lessons. Ann

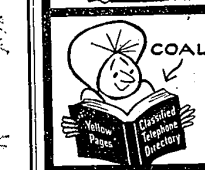
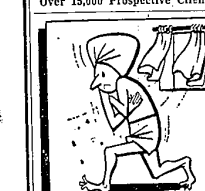
Musical talent will be supplied for this concert by New Artists of America, Inc. concert management organization.

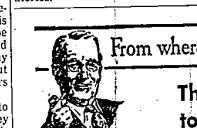
Takes Advanced Army Training

Janzcek was trained to drive the Army's medium tank. He passed the 30 and 50 caliber machine gun proficiency tests and qualified as a gunner in the firing of the 90 millimeter tank gun. Under the packet platoon system of training, each trainee becomes a permanent member of a tank crew.

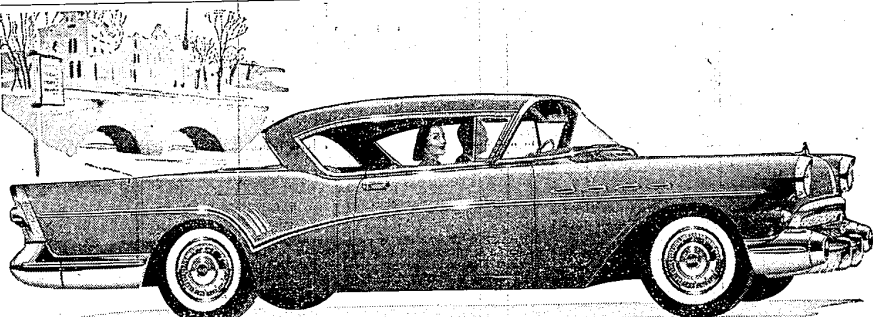
