Christmas Tree Law Explained

According to the Christmas tree law, anyone cutting, moving or transporting a Christmas tree or evergreen boughs must have a bill of sale from the land owner. Bill of sale forms may be had free from the Department of Agriculture, state police posts, sheriff's offices, Conservation department offices or from agricultural agents.

An exception is when a person buys trees from someone who is not the original owner. In such cases the person transporting the trees must have a simple bill of sale showing number of trees and the name and address of the person from whom the purchase was made.

Property owners moving their own trees must carry a deed or tax receipt proving ownership of the property on which the trees or evergreen boughs were cut.

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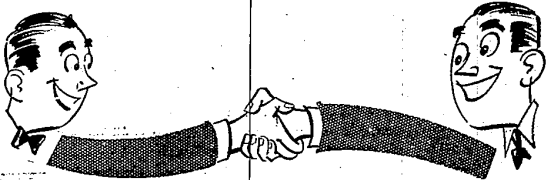
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
