## Youth Christmas Concert Planned

## Many Still Eligible For Korean Bonus

Nearly 30,000 Michigan Korean veterans who are considered to be eligible for the State Korean bonus have failed to make application. The deadline for filing is March 7, 1957.

Families of servicemen who served during the Korean conflict and are still on active duty should advise these men that they do not have to wait until they are discharged from service to make an application.

If they served any time between June 27, 1950 and December 31, 1953, and meet the other eligibility requirements, they are eligible to file even though they are still on active duty.
