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New Handling Process Set Up At Farm. Cleaners

A completely new operational procedure to speed handling of clothing and service to customers was recently installed at the Farmington Cleaners plant at 32725 Grand River Avenue.

Installation of the new system is speeding up the time of service to customers by over 20 percent, Reno Carter, owner stated. It has also increased handling space at the plant, reduced work loads for employees considerably and cut confusion and flaws in handling considerably, he added.

From the first cleaning operation at the back of the plant, clothes are transported on overhead slide bars to the various presses. After being cleaned and pressed they are returned to the slide bars to be forwarded toward the front of the building to be inspected and placed in garment bags. If any sewing is to be done the clothes are first moved to another section of the building where this operation is taken care of.

A unique color tab system is employed whereby workers can determine at a glance the order in which items of clothing are to be proceeded.

Delays and confusion in processing are thus almost completely eliminated.

After garments have been cleaned, pressed, inspected and placed in garment bags, they are spotted in numerical order on a large oval conveyor line running from the back plant to the reception counter at the front of the building. When a customer comes in to pick up clothing, the girl at the counter need only step on a pedal advancing the clothing on the conveyor line to the front counter. Waiting time for customers is thus reduced considerably.

Another foot pedal controlling the conveyor line from the back plant makes it possible for workers to put clothing on the pickup rack in proper order without moving from one spot.

PORK


