Farmington Council of PTAs Organized, Officer Elected

At an organizational meeting held Wednesday evening, December 12, the Farmington Council of Parent-Teacher Associations was formally set up.

A major portion of the meeting was devoted to a review of by-laws for the new organization as drawn up by a by-law's committee earlier. Representatives of all PTA groups in the Farmington School District with the exception of one, Eagle School PTA, were present at the meeting to hear the by-laws read and give their formal approval to them as corrected. It is hoped that the Eagle School PTA will join the Council in the near future.

Several changes were made in the by-laws as drawn up by David Mills and Samuel Kosmosky and read before the group by Mr. Kosmosky but were all of a minor nature.

A slate of officers for the association as presented by Mrs. Samuel Turner of the nominating committee was approved by the representatives at the meeting. Since no nominations were made from the floor, these officers were elected without opposition.

Royal Davis, a former teacher in the Farmington school system now employed with the Chrysler Corporation was elected president of the association. Other officers elected were: Mrs. Fred Hamilton, vice president; Evangeline Breyfogle, teacher vice-president; Mrs. Edward Kessler, mother vice-president; Byron Oliver, father vice-president; Mrs. Theodore Lapinski, secretary; Wade Braum, historian; Samuel Kosmosky, treasurer; and Mrs. Leonard Stidwell, legislator.

The purpose of the Farmington Council of Parent-Teacher Associations as spelled out in the by-laws will be to "meet for conferences and cooperation in matters of child welfare only. It shall not legislate for Congress units." It was further spelled out in the by-laws that the Council shall be non-commercial, non-sectarian and non-partisan and that no commercial

enterprise and no candidate for office shall be endorsed by it.

It was indicated that the policies of the Council will be in harmony with the policies of the Michigan branch and the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and its program will be educational and shall be developed through conferences, committees and projects.

The Council shall not seek to direct the administrative activities of the school or to control their policies in any way, it was pointed out.

It was emphasized in conversation on the by-laws that the Council would definitely not try or be permitted to legislate to individual PTAs in the Council recording their operations, projects, etc. The Council will, however, give recommendations and advise on matters brought to its attention by an individual unit, it was stated.

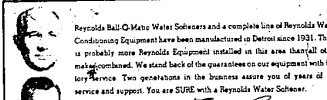

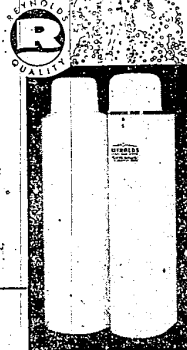

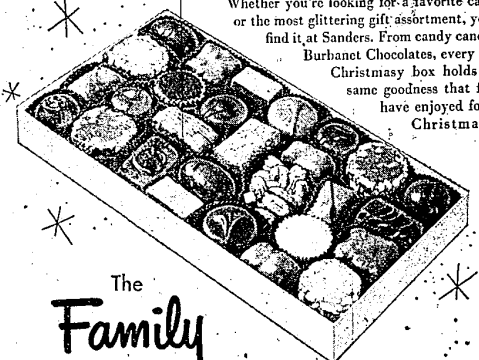
