

Youth Center Looks For Help

FARMINGTON The Farmington Youth Assistance summer activity center, opening this week at Grace Elementary School, is looking for some help.

"Donations have been received from only two community organizations and

five Farmington churches," coordinator Mrs. Pat Erger said. They could still use funds, or "anything from old furniture to sit on to a case of pop - art supplies to checker games."

Starting July 9, the center will be open from 3 p.m. to 6

p.m. and 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday, with special outings on some Saturdays.

The program will run for eight weeks.

Movies are planned Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Things like Charlie Chaplin, W.C. Fields, Laurel and Hardy - also some informative short features."

On other nights there will be crafts and games.

Silk-screen techniques, movie making, macrame, guitar instruction and decoupage are planned.

The center has a three-man staff: Director Marsha Richman, and assistants Jack Mingo and Judy Orsini.

The expressed purpose of the center is to establish a "summer outreach" program which will provide recreational and cultural activi-

ties for teens living primarily in the southeast section of Farmington.

Organizers of the program expect approximately 150 participants this summer.

"An important part of the center to the people who come here is the chance to talk with people their own age and with adults who will listen," Miss Richman said.

"We try to provide a group experience for the kids that they wouldn't normally be

exposed to in their everyday lives."

Some of the special trips planned this summer are a Tiger baseball game, a trip to Edgewater amusement park, and the Detroit Art and Historical Museums. Camping, canoeing, swimming and hayrides are also planned.

All activities are free. People with donations of anything the participants can use are asked to call Mrs. Erger at the FYA office.
