Addresses as exotic as Bombay, Agra, Delhi and Kashmir will be on the itinerary of two Redford Township teachers who departed last week on a nine-week learning tour of India.

The teachers are Mrs. Marcella Esser of MacGowan Elementary School in Redford Union School District and Mrs. Lynn Golonka of Thurston High School in Redford.

Mrs. Esser lives in Farmington and Mrs. Golonka is a Livonia resident.

They are among 25 Michigan teachers participating in

a summer institute in India, sponsored by Eastern Michigan University and the University of Punjab in Chandigarh, the tour is partially funded by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The trip is designed so teachers can develop curricula to make learning about India more realistic for Michigan students. Each teacher will concentrate on a certain grade level and subject, such as Indian art, major religions, or legal system.

Traveling the breadth of India, teachers will tour modern cities as well as the remains of ancient civilizations. They will explore India's culture, society, education, political system and history. Five weeks of study at the University of Punjab and a visit to the Education Research Center in Delhi will highlight their stay.

The teachers plan to learn about India firsthand by meeting with heads of state, scholars, teachers, community leaders and children.

Mrs. Esser, who will teach second and third grade next year, said she is planning a curriculum comprised of songs and stories she will write about India's people and land.

Mrs. Golonka, an English teacher and yearbook advisor, said she hopes to improve Thurston's creative writing program and provide input for a Far East social sciences course to be offered next year.

Using the standard reading vocabulary of her students' grade levels, Mrs. Esser

said, her stories will relate to concepts in reading, social studies - and science. The songs, she hopes, will reinforce concepts and vocabulary presented in the stories.

Mrs. Esser developed 62 ideas she wants to explore during her stay. They are based on second and third grade curriculum and her preparatory research on India.

"I hope to emphasize similarities rather than differences between the children of India and our country," said Mrs. Esser. As an example, she said, children in both countries have pets and play games, although each may be different.

Mrs. Esser said she was impressed in her research by the strong family system in Indian culture. She said she hopes to discover if the children develop a sense of discipline and well-being despite some lack of material things.

Mrs. Golonka collected 200 questions about India from her students. Based on the questions, she said she hopes to create a picture book to be printed on Thurston's press.

She also is considering writing a story about Indian school children to be used in a creative writing class.

Both teachers plan to tape Indian music and some take photographs, and collect a number of artifacts, including records, slides, books and art objects.

"It's a remarkable opportunity," said Mrs. Golonka. "I feel our understanding at home. We

mustn't overlook our obligation to mankind."

Before their departure, each teacher met for six day-long sessions. They heard lectures from faculties of the Asian Studies department at the University of Michigan and the Indian Studies department at Eastern Michigan University. Representatives from the Ethnic Project Group of the Ann Arbor school system, also spoke to them.

Both teachers will meet again next fall in two day-long conferences to exchange curricula and materials gathered during their summer research.

Their itinerary includes a two-day stopover in Rome before arriving in India. There they will visit Bombay, Bangalore, Madras, Hyderabad, Jaipur, Agra, Delhi, New Delhi, Chandigarh, Srinagar, Kashmir, and other cities and villages.

Teachers from both countries will exchange educational ideas. The Americans will take along learning aids furnished by the Farmington Chapter of the Michigan Assn. for Children with Learning Disabilities.

Dr. Erma Murchlind, director of International Studies at Eastern, is head of the summer institute. Serving as guide to the Americans is Dr. Ranjit Bajwa, professor of education at Eastern and a native of Punjab.

Captive Nation Festival Set

The Captive Nations Ethnic Festival will be held on the Detroit riverfront near Cobo Hall on July 13, 14 and 15.

Entertainment will be provided by 20 singing, dancing and musical groups representing the countries of Albania, Armenia, Poland, Romania, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Slovakia, Serbia, the Ukraine, Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia and Croatia.

An ecumenical service will be held Sunday at 2:20 p.m. in Kennedy Square followed by a march to the festival site where a commemorative program will begin at 3 p.m., featuring U.S. Rep. Charles Diggs (D-Detroit) as the speaker.

BOND DETAILS: Said General Obligation Bonds will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, dated May 1, 1973, maturing in arrears on the maturity of 1 year and will bear interest from their date of issue on August 1, 1973, and semi-annually thereafter.

Said Special Assessment Bonds will mature on the 15th day of August, as follows:

- \$2,000.00 August 15 of each of the years 1974 and 1975;

INTEREST RATE AND MATURITY: The interest rate on bonds shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding 5 1/2% per annum, to be fixed by the bondholder, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1.00%.

On any one bond shall be set one only, all bonds maturing in any one year shall carry the same interest rate and each coupon period shall be represented by one interest coupon. GOOD FAITH: A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$500.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City, must accompany each of the bonds as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. CITY OF FARMINGTON NOTICE TO ELECTORS AND TAXPAYERS OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON OF INTENT TO ISSUE BONDS SECURED BY THE CITY'S TAXING POWER AND RIGHT OF REFERENDUM RELATING THERETO

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the City Council of the City of Farmington intends to adopt resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of Special Assessment Bonds for the principal amount not to exceed in total Seventeen Thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of defraying the special assessment districts' share of the cost of constructing street improvements in the City. Said bonds will be payable in not more than 15 annual installments, with interest at a rate or rates not to exceed 6% per annum on the balance of the bonds from time to time remaining unpaid.

SOURCE OF PAYMENT OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENT BONDS

THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SAID SPECIAL ASSESSMENT BONDS shall be payable primarily from collections of an equal amount of special assessments, and the bonds shall also pledge the full faith and credit of the City of Farmington.

In the case of the insufficiency of said special assessments, the principal and interest on said bonds shall be payable from the general funds of the City or, if necessary, from ad valorem taxes levied upon all taxable property in the City, without limitation as to rate or amount.

RIGHT OF REFERENDUM

THE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT BONDS will be issued without vote of the electors unless a petition signed by not less than 10% of the registered electors in the City is filed with the City Council within thirty (30) days after publication by depositing same in the office of the City Clerk. If such a petition is filed, the bonds against which such petition is filed may not be issued unless approved by a majority vote of the electors of the City voting on the question of their issuance.
