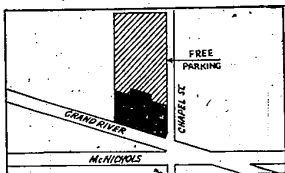

## Says 2nd Class Mail Important To Education

"Next to the public school system itself," writes Rep. Usher L. Burdick of North Dakota in a leading national magazine, "second-class postage is the finest thing Congress ever did for the education of the American public. As one who believes that democracy cannot work without knowledgeable citizens, I should like to express my hope that this service will long continue unimpaired."

Mr. Burdick recalls that he learned his ABC's in the Sioux country of North Dakota from a magazine called Farm, Home and Fireside. It carried exciting stories, described new farming methods and provided tantalizing glimpses of the world beyond the horizon.

"We could get a Farm, Home and Fireside subscription for 25 cents because in 1879, the year it was born, Congress set postage rates for magazines and newspapers so more people could afford to buy them. Congress figured that the more people read and learned, the better government by the people would work."

"And they were right. I finally went to college and got housebroken to books; but for me, as for most Americans, newspapers and magazines remain essential teachers—many of these publications, so essential to the maintenance and growth of our freedom, simply could not exist without low second-class postage rates."

## Fast Reader Not Always Best, Says Professor

The fast reader is not always the "best" reader, says a Michigan State University professor of English.

Dr. V. E. Leitch criticizes the recent stress on speed in reading, contending that the emphasis perhaps should be on slower and more careful reading.

"Many of the greatest minds of the past were the products of a few books which were carefully read and re-read until the thoughts of their authors were thoroughly assimilated," Dr. Leitch pointed out.

"Because good books not only reward thought but also provoke it, justice can be done them in a hurried reading, or even in a single careful reading."

A specialist in reading recently predicted it would be possible for an individual to read at the rate of 40,000 words per minute with the assistance of machines to speed up turning of pages.

"That may be possible," Dr. Leitch allows, "but it would also be futile." At that rate, he noted, the average novel could be read in four minutes.

"Without understanding there can be no true appreciation of literature," the English authority contends.

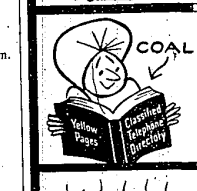

## Protection From Polio Needed By Teens And Young Adults Too

Teen-agers and young adults need protection against polio just as much as young children need to be vaccinated, the Michigan Department of Health said last week. Ninety-five per cent of all paralytic polio cases in Michigan occur in persons under 35 years of age, the health department said.

Records show that the severity of paralysis increases with the age of the patient. For example, 25 per cent of all polio cases in Michigan occur in the 15-25 age group. But this same group accounts for 30 per cent of the polio deaths.

The state health department has recommended that as a public health measure all Michigan residents under 36 years of age should receive polio shots. This would leave only five per cent of the potential victims unprotected, all of them 20 years old or older.

Vaccinating 95 per cent of the potential polio victims in the state would virtually eliminate chances for future polio epidemics, the health department said.

However, if persons 36 years old or older want to be vaccinated as a personal health measure, their private physicians probably will recommend that they receive the vaccine, the health department added.

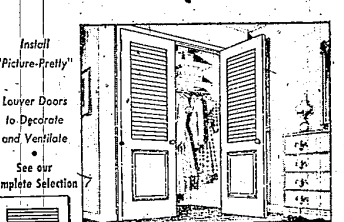
In Michigan, polio vaccine is supplied without charge to physicians and local health departments for vaccinating children 1 through 14 years of age and pregnant women of all ages. About 70 per cent of the persons in these groups have now received two or more doses of polio vaccine, the department said.

The vaccine is available to all other persons through regular commercial channels.
