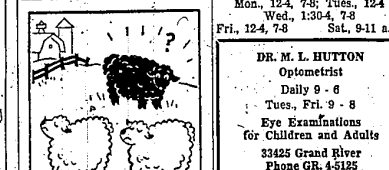

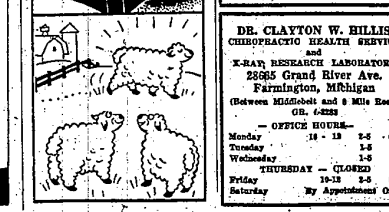

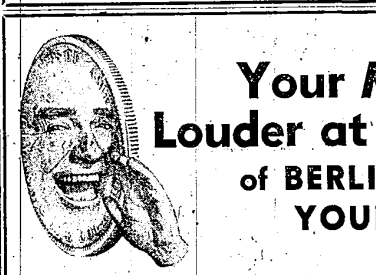
From here they plan to continue to New Mexico and then on to Los Angeles, Hollywood and San Francisco. They will return home along a northern route in May.
